This is certainly a great point gained, and may, if practised, save many from deep distress and arrest the progress of a threatening calamity.'

He procured medical aid as soon as possible, and by their active exertions the other two children were saved from immediate death, though it remains doubtful whether they will recover. The eldest child that

died, was about 5 years of age .-Those who survived were from 7 to 10. From what the surviving children say, it is supposed that Mrs. Sperry who has been for two or three years by turns a little deranged, gathered cicuta, or, as some call it, woodchuck root, steeped it in warm water, and fed her children, and drank plentifully of it herself, with a view of saving them and herself, in the embraces of death; from penury and want, which she had frequently insisted was coming upon themalthough it is understood Mr. Sperry is in good circumstances.

New-York, July 6. Extract of a letter received by a gentleman, from Buenos Ayres, dated April 20, 1819.
