At Shirlevsburgh they were joined by Mr. Patrick M'Garey and Mr. James Ramsey, also on horseback. In Millin county Mr. Ephraim Enser and Mr. William Price, of Waynesburg, joined them. These gentlemen pursued the trails of the three men whom they supposed to be the robbers, and who had robbed one or two spring-houses in the course of the pr ceding night. At a small tavern or dramshop, one and a half or two miles below Lewistown, and 60 or 70 miles from the scene of robbery, it was ascertained that three men had taken lodgings for the night. S m. guarded the house, and others rushed in, and before the supposed robbers were completely awakened, they were secured. No doubt there would have been bloody work had the three robbers had their pistols and knives at command, which it does not seem they had, though all three were well armed, when tra velling, there being found in their sleeping room, two large light horsepistols, a small one, and two very efficient carving or butcher knives, which it is believed were stolen by Lewis and one of his companions. out of Mr. Shively's tavern, at the

After the robbers were brought to Lewistown, and in the act of taking supper, which the pursuers had ordered, Lewis perceiving that a pistol had been inadvertently placed on a side table near where h was sitting, suddenly jumped up, seized the pistol and made for the door .-In the entry he knocked down one man and pushed another aside, and ran up the street. He was pursued by Mr. Price and Mr. Enser. On overtaking him Mr. Price seized him-but Lewis being too strong for him, threw him off, and, in the act of commencing his race, he was laid hold of by Mr. Enser, who told the Editor that if he had not thought himself able to manage Lewis, he would have shot him. Mr. Enser attempted to throw him, but failed -and Lewis finding himself watched, turned his hand round and snap ped his pistol at the breast of Enser-which fortunately did not go off. At this moment Mr. Enser brought Lewis to the ground with a horrid crash-where he lay for about a minute apparently lifeless. He and his companions were then ironed and lodged in the jail of Lewistown for the night.
