Some of the letters state, that Mr. Forsyth had quitted Madrid, and was on his way to Cadis, to embark for America. Other letters state, that the Duke de San Carlos will return to the Ministry of the State. It is, however, more probable, that it will be M. Lozana de Torres, whose successor in the ministry of Justice is álready designated. It is also said that Don Onis will replace General Alava at the Hague.

Advices from Marseilles state; that 4000 English are expected at Genoa, to form the garrison of that town. By this it appears, that all the maritime arrangements of various governments are directed against the Barbary Powers.

An article under the head of Turin, the 28th of August, mentions, that the three commercial houses here, those of Henry Bolimeda, Paracca and Vasco, and Ramono Vigitello, have stopped payment. The house of Guiseppi, Vinatier & Go. had previously failed.

A Dresden paragraph, of the 31st of Aug. announces, that on the 28th of this month, the marriage of the Princess Josephine, to the King of Spain, was celebrated by procurati-

on. She was adon to set out for Spain. The Dublin Commercial Gazette of Wednesday last, says, "On Sunday night the guards at the Castle were trebled, the pieces of artillery on the spot, were prepared for my emergency, and a strong body of horse was ordered to patrole on the Naasa road. Similiar precautions were taken at the last mentioned town; the guards were then doubled, and the staff of the Kildare militia was ordered on duty. It is also asserted in letters from the Queen's county, that several nightly meetings have taken place in the neighbourhood of Mount Mellick of persons in arms."

An article from Rastadt of the 1st of September, says, that all the letters from the interior of Germany, speak of the importance of the armaments which are actively going forward in the Austrian Monarchy; one half the officers and men should | 86,000 recruits have been distributed amongst the different corps, and a second levy is talked of. The battalions of the Landwehr are all armed and ready to join the regiments of the line. 4000 horses have been purchased in Holstein, to temove the heavy cavalry.

Accounts from Wurtzburg, state that on the night of the 18th the windows of the houses inhabited by the Jews were broken at Somerack and Kimpou. In this last town the populace, not content with breaking the windows of the bynagogue, penetrated into the interior, and destroyed every thing that served for the exercise of the Jewish worship.

The king of Bavaria has decided that the town of Wurtzburg must indemnify the Jews for the losses they have suffered in the late tumult there, and that the amount of the indemnity shall be imposed on such of the inhabitants as have exvited their troubles.
