The r ver of St. Juan communicates with the Lake of Nicaragua, a river of great magnitude, and assuredly navigabl or apable of being made so, for vesse sof the larg-Lake from the river. vel# space (as I should judge by the m.p) of only 30 miles to Niconia, a village or town on the NW. corner of the Gulf of Panama. Cut this through, and the waters of the Pacific flow into the Atlantic Ocean!!
