We believe there is no subject upon which the impartial expenditure of public money will be more readily sanctioned by the approbation of our fellow citizens than the one here alluded to. It is one, whose bene ficial influence is felt as much by the far mer, as the merchant, by the country as the city, and indeed extends its salutary effects to every department of industry. The roads and canals connected with the pros-perity and advancement of our own commercial metropolis, and those leading to the city of Washington and George town, which although ceded from our jurisdiction, ought not to be on that account, less the object of our recard and justice, form the mos tensively useful and important parts of any system of internal improvement, we can propose to our consideration. But attention is also due to every other part of the state, where a little public aid, co operating with the exertions of individuals particularly interested, may often build a bridge, make road, improve a river, or open a canal. which private resources alone would not be capable of accomplishing. If, at this time, it is not in our power immediately to engale in works of this kind, yet little expence would be incur ed in making surveys and examinations of the common, in particular places, with a view to future undertakings of public utility. Even at this time i might perhaps be deemed adviscable by those, who feel an interest in the prosperity of the me tropolis of the state, to ascertain, whether it be not practicable to connect it with the cities of Washington and Laltimore, and the rich county of Frederick, by roads much shorter and better than those now in use

Fourteen years have elapsed since the passage of the insolvent law now in force. This length of time has afforded an opportunity to test by experience the practical wisdom and utility of the systemthat has been adopted on that subject. And perhaps also the same lapse of time has put it in the power of chicanery and cunning to convert a law intended for benevolent, just, and salutary purposes, into an instrument of fraud and dishonesty. That the laws o the country should interpose to protect unfortunate and honest delitors from the oppression of hardhearted and severe creditors, is certainly has sound policy, indeed an absolute duty. But that an indulgent & merciful creditor should be defrauded of his just debt, by means of fraudulent conveyances or concealments of property by an unprincipled debtor who possesses the means of payment, is an injustice, for which molegislature could ever have intended to afford an opportunity by the provisions of its laws. Of occurrences of this soit, we believe, complaints have been heard in every part of the state.
