London, Aug. 30.  
This morning her Maj'st arrived in town at 10 o'clock. Her Maj'st had expressed a wish that she should be in attendance at the House of Lords as early as possible, that they might have personal communication with her on subjects which might arise in course of examination of the witnesses. Her Maj'st was preceded by Alderman Wood, by her Maj'st's command, the orders for the state carriage to brought to the door.

At 12 p.m. ten, her majesty announced that she was ready to proceed to Palace-Yard, and immediately afterwards entered her carriage, which was thrown open for benefit of the spectators. Her Maj'st wore a dove-coloured hat, brim of which inclined very much, both at the front and back. It was ornamented with a plume feathers of the same colour—round her neck her Maj'st wore a collar of extraordinary magnitude. The people assembled to see her pass were few in number, and even those manifestly but little enthusiastic. As her majesty passed Carlton-Palace she turned her eyes in opposite direction with an assumed air of disgust. This seemed to please her followers, and they noticed it by cries of "Bravo!" and clapping their hands.

In the windows of the houses in Pall Mall and Cockspur street, we did not notice a respectable person. At 10 minutes after 11 o'clock she arrived in front of the House of Lords. The military and the officers of the House received her Maj'st in the usual manner; the soldiers presented arms, and the music played the Royal salute. Her majesty proceeded to her retiring room, where she was immediately attended by Mr. Brougham.

*Assault on the Duke of Wellington.*—The treatment received yesterday by the Duke of Wellington, was more serious than it has been represented. Long after the Queen had left the House of Lords a party of about 200 of the populace remained at the end of great George-street, as if lying in wait for his Grace. On his approach they pressed close on him, and assailed him with a most tremendous yell. One blow caught at his bridle, and another attempted to seize his stirrups, apparently with a view to unhorse him. The patrol seeing his Grace's danger rushed forward, drew their cutlasses. A severe scuffle ensued. One of them aimed a blow at the man who attempted to unhorse the Duke, but it was turned aside, and struck a woman on the arm, who received a deep wound. In the mean time the Duke remounted his pace, and got off into the Park. His Grace and the patrol were pelted with mud and oyster shells all the way down great George-street.

Paris, Aug. 21.  
The funds which had fallen to 7, 25, have subsequently recovered to 77, 99.  
The Court of Peers is ordered to assemble immediately to proceed without delay to the trial of the individuals arrested at Paris.  
The Comte de Rochechouart, all the Chambers being assembled held yesterday a secret sitting, which is supposed to relate to the conspiracy.  
The manner in which government first received an intimation of the conspiracy, was, by a fortuitous but most singular chance. A female who was accustomed to read the newspapers at the Tuilleries, in returning the journal she had borrowed, left it in, unawares, a letter that had just reached her. This letter was to the effect of advising her instantly to quit Paris, in order to avoid the consequences of a revolution that was about to break out. This letter fell thus into strange hands, was read, and the female to

writer of it who had put the authorities in possession of the plot. We are unknown present, how far he botched up the plot. It is asserted that one circumstance was occasioned by negligence or imprudence of a workman who was employed in repairing the fire arms used at the festival of St. Louis. Several parts of the building received some damage from a pistol explosion; success was protracted, at four o'clock, was mastered; no person was lucky three barrels of gunpowder and one of saltpetre were burnt.

Since this eve the castle has been closed, and the troops who form the garrison are placed under a countersign. General Greville repaired to the castle on Tuesday evening, & passed the night there. The castle has been greatly damaged, but nobody has perished. The commune is quite quiet, and notwithstanding the immense crowd the festival has attracted, not the least disorder taken place. The plan of the conspirators was to seize the Louvre and to penetrate by the galleries of the museum to the apartments, whilst by way of diversion the soldiers who were to have been gained, were to have a skirmish on the Place du Carrousel with the Guards of the F.

Madame Elisa Bacchini, of Buonaparte, and Ex-Duchess Lucca and Piomonte, has resided at Trieste, of a nervous ver.

Letters from Ancona state, preparations were making in advance for the reception of Austrian troops expected from Italy.

The late conspiracy has not interrupted the public diet. The number of the military engaged does not exceed 250, and among them above the rank of captain. We add with regret, that some of them belonged to the second regiment of the guard distinguished by its sentiments of honour and duty. The preliminary investigation of their conduct has commenced. It appears they did not dare to fulfil their project to the soldiers. Some of the conspirators have fled.

All the barriers of Paris were shut from 11 o'clock on Saturday till 7 on Sunday morning. Since then the passage has been perfectly free. The guard was reinforced at all posts and stations at new ones.

An account of the Queen's land is at present in treaty for purchasing, in the name of her Majesty, a very large property situated in the Forest of Sena, a distance from Paris.
