From the Cooperstown Journal.

Several years since, the garrison of American officers at Plattsburg, took up the remains of Col. Wellington, and a lieutenant of his regiment, who were killed on the 6th Sept. 1814, and deposited them in the burying ground at Plattaburg, near the spot where the American and British officers, who fell on the 11th Sept of the same year, were entombed. The funeral peremonies were performed by Major Worth's corps of Infantry.

Col. Wellington commanded the 3d Buffs, and led the advance of the British army through Beekmantown.

The transaction in question, so creditable to our officers, and evidencing elevated and refined feeling, produced the annexed tribute from a northern bard, which originally appeared in the Plattsburg paper.
