In the decision of this case, im-priant to the stability of every va-lable principle of our constitution, rejoice, that no party feelings or action are at issue, as the conflictagrandidates agree in political sentmeats, that therefore anticipate a correct decision of this constitution-Aquestion, whenever it may come befere the legislature. It will no doubt be contended on the part of the Minister, that having resigned li license or commission in the harch, prior to taking his seat in the Legisteture, or prior to his elecica, will obviate all constitutional Mections. But I cannot convince aplelf, that this resignation in enter case, can constitutionally enim to a seat in the Legislatie. In order to attain a correct tosstruction of this article of the tossitution, it is necessary to at-

the incorruntible purity of the er-fring by precluding their association with the government, and leaving their minds in that, happy and salutary balance, which might dispose them to attend exclusively to the sacred ducies of their vocation, the advancement of the moral and religious rectitude, peace and hapminess of society."

I wonld ask, under this view of the question, under those feelings and sentiments of the framers of the constitution, whether a Minister or Preacher of the Cospel, by a tompo rary, insincere and collusive withdrawal from the Cliurch, can be permitted to take his seat in the Legislature to aid in fanning the unholy flame of sectarian ascendency, and having effected his views, resume with complacency his sacred vocation. If this article of the conattitution, so highly important in guarding the liberties of the people, can be so easily eluded, I would ask, if it is thought, contrary to the admonitions of uniform experience. that the present purity of the clergy, would preclude them embracing so easy an evasion? I would ask, if it is thought prudent, to set such a snare for their virtue? I would ask, if it was thought advisable, to open the doors that Legislature to sec-

There can be no doubt, that the particular disposition of mind, under which a resignation of their sacerdotal functions may arise, should determine the eligibility or ineligibility of any minister claiming a seat in our Legislature. The only 'difficulty arises in ascertaining this definite state of mind; for imposition will often be attempted, and I fear, a fruitful source of corruption is presented, that will eventuate in fearful consequences, without a timely and prudent decision should be adopted. I know of no criterion, whereby the quo animo of the minister can be come at, which should determine his eligibility, but by observing his general deportment, religious zeal and disposition, prior to, and attendant on the resignation of

his sacred vocation. If those circumstances & deportment should evince a sincerity of intention of permanent relinquishment of his ministerial vocation, his eligibility might be plausibly maintained; but if those circumstances and deportment should prove a settled determination of corrupt deception and fraudulent evasion of the spirit of the constitution, he should indignantly be spurned a seat, which he should thus surreptitiously and unconstitutionally attempt to usurp.

But it may be said, that a simple resignation of their vocation, connected with uniform rectitude of deportment, and the general respect due to the sacredness of the order, should induced general belief of a compliance with the spirit of the constitution, unless direct proof to the contrary can be adduced. But for myself, I must acknowledge, that an abandonment of so sacred a trust and pursuit, replete with perspective happiness so full, as to inundate their present feelings with joy in conceivable, to mingle in the turmoils of politics and conflicts of party, would be sufficient to satisfy me, that there must be some impo unholy and imperious motive, that could effect so monstrous a seperation, so extraordinary an abjuration of divine vocation, as a permanent withdrawal from the ministry of the church. INQUIRER.

NOTE BY THE EDITOR. On this subject, we have merely to remark, that this fair constitutional question, we trust, will receive dispassionate decision.
