A BY-LAW For the protection of Property from destructive Fires.

Be it established and ordained, by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Common Council, of the city of Annapolis, and the authority of the same, That a Fire Engine and Hose Company be and the same is hearby established, subject to the following rules and regulations:

1st. The clerk of the corporation 'shall make out, and constantly keep "The army in the north is going a regular roll of all the white male inhabitants of the city, over the age of course all is now for the republic. of twenty-one years, (which roll may be amended and corrected from time to time,) all of whom shall be considered as owing a proportion of personal services to secure the safety of the city from five, by submitting to proper regulations, and requiring suitable discipline to act with efficiency, when such fires

An annual meeting of the company shall be held on the first Saturday of December of every year, at three belock, PM. at the Engine House, for the purpose of general elections, revising the bylaws and regulations that may be adopted by the company, not contrary to the provisions of this act, superintending the anirs of the company, and inspecting the actounts. Any member neglecting to attend said meeting, shall be fined the sum of one dollar, unless within ten days thereafter, a sufficient in ten days thereafter, a sufficient excuse be assigned to a majority of the three directors,

company; one first Director, who shall preside at the meeting of the company; one second Director, one third Director; one Captain of the Hose Company; one Captain o Captain of the Conqueror Engine; one Captain of Buckets and Lanes; one Captain of Ludders and Axe-Men; one Secretary; one Treasurer; and one Collector; and they shall from time to time fill any vucancy that may occur in said offices for any unexpired part of a year.

6th. The three directors shall proceed to determine the number of members each company shall consist of, and on the introduction of any new members, or the striking off of any names therefrom, the companies shall be completed or abridged by the directors as they

may consider necessary.

7th. Each captain shall have the nomination of his sub-officers, and regulation of his compeny, by such rules and by-laws, as he may direct, subject nevertheless to the revisal or rejection of a majority of his company, and consistent at all times with the ordinances and general

rules of the company. 8th. It shall be the duty of the directors, agreeable to grade, to have the supreme command of the company in times of alarm of fire, and at all meetings of the company for exercise and discipline; each shall be provided accordingly with a speaking trumpet-upon an alarm they must be first at the scene of danger, to assign to the companies and engines, their respective positi-

ons as they arrive. 9th. Each captain shaif have the command and care of the class and apparatus assigned him, for the complete order of every article of which, at all times prepared and convenient for service, he is accountable, as well as for the regularity & promptitude of his command. At the sound of alarm it is his duty to be first at the engine house, of which each captain shall have a key, and from thence, with his command, to be first at the scene of danger. He is bound to have every apparatus restored to its place after the danger ceases.

10th. Every penalty for neglect of duty shall be doubled when cap tains are the persons subject to them, and treoled when directors are sub-

ject to them, 11th. In every case, where an officer of the company may be absent, the next in grade shall be considered as succeeding to his command, his duties and penalties.

12th. It shall be the duty of the collector to keep a roll of the company, to call it when required, to note absentees, and co furnish the directors with a list thereof, within three days thereafter; and in fif-teen days the directors shall return the same, with the amount of each fine imposed, (If not excused.) to the clerk, whose any it shall be to keep a book, and record the same therein, after which he shall return the said list, or a coly thereof, to the collector, who shall proceed to the collector, who shall proceed to collect the same as other small debts are or can be collected by authority of the corporation; and it shall be the duty of the collector, once every three months, to account to the treasurer, and pay over his said collections deduction the collections deduction the collections deduction the collections deductions are collected to collected the collections deductions are collected to collected by authority of the coll ections, deducting twenty per centum thereof for his services. And it shall be the duty of the treasurer to keep a regular account of all mo. nies received or paid by him as treasurer of the fire company.

13th. The funds of the fire company shail be subject to such purposes only, as the company, or its regulations may authorise, and shall especially be applied to keeping the apparatus in complete condition, or renewing and improving the same, or is bestowing premiums for meritorious conduct at the time of fires,

14th. Extra meetings of the com pany may be called by either of the directors. The captains may require their class to neet when necessary, but penalties it absonce in those cases are not to be inflicted.

15th. Minor and coloured men, may be received as members of the respective companies, by consent of the officers thereof.
