WHEREAS, by the act to which this is a supplement, the several banks then, or thereafter incorporated, or whose charters should be renewed or extended within this state, are prohibited from issuing bank notes of a less denomination than five dollars or of any intermediate denomination between five and ten, which prohibition has been in sunary instances violated to the great inconvenience and loss of the community; therefore, Be it enacted, by the General As
