The coobler declared he would not. Arkwright then shaved him for the half penny. and immediately gave nim two pair of shoes to mend. This was the basis of Arkwright's extraordinary fortune, for the coboler, struck with this unexpected favour, introduced him to the inspection of a cotton machine invented by his particular friend. The plan of this Arkwright got possession of, and it gradually led him to the honour of knightio d and the accumulation of half a million of money.
