

**Annaboli's Thursday**

The Committee on the Judiciary have acquired Judge... The charge preferred against Samuel Barnes, and published in the Gazette of the 24th January... The bill to regulate the duties of the sheriff in this State, was rejected, 32 to 23.

Mr. J. S. Spence reports a bill for the relief of the poor in Worcester. Mr. Kennedy reports a bill to incorporate the president and directors of the shot tower company of Worcester.

Mr. Barney reports a further additional supplement to the act to provide for the opening and extension of Pratt street in the city of Baltimore.

The clerk of the senate returns the bill for the benefit of Basil L. Stoker & others, and the bill for the relief of Rowell Noble of the city of Baltimore, passed with amendments, and the further supplement to the act for making certain roads in Baltimore and Harford counties, passed.

Friday, Feb. 1. The supplement to the act for founding a college on the western shore, &c. the bills for the benefit of Wm. Harness, Wm. Osborn, Thomas I. Perry, to continue in force the laws which would expire with the present session, for the benefit of Marcellus Keene of the city of Baltimore, and the further supplement to the act to incorporate the stockholders in the Union Bank of Maryland, were generally passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Waters reports a further supplement to the act for the recovery of small debts out of court. The clerk of the senate returns the bills for the benefit of Robert Ushton and Benjamin Arno; and empowering the levy court of Cecil to levy a sum of money to build a bridge over Octorara creek, severally passed.

Mr. Bruce reports a further supplement to the act for licensing and regulating ordinary keepers. Mr. Edelin obtained leave to report a further supplement to the act authorizing a lottery to raise a sum of money to build a church in Cecil county.

Mr. Pizman reports a bill for the benefit of Barbara Hoffman and others. Mr. Norris reports a bill to authorize a lottery to pave the streets of Belle Air. Mr. Forwood reports a bill altering and mending the road from Baltimore to Belle Air.

The bills for the benefit of Moses Shepard; and to incorporate the Jefferson Association, and to make valid a deed, were rejected. Mr. Martin reports the bill to change such parts of the constitution as relate to the election of the governor and council, as amended.

The bill for the relief of Sarah Fleming, was rejected. Mr. Duvall reports a bill to authorize the levy court of Montgomery, to sell certain land.

Saturday, Feb. 2. The resolution in favour of Richard W. West, was passed and sent to the senate. A PETITION. From the presidents of the banks in Baltimore County, to the petition of the Farmers Bank of Maryland.

Mr. Benjamin Forrest announced the death of James Brooke Esq. a delegate from Kent county, and moved the following order which was assented to. Ordered, that the delegation from Kent county, together with that of Prince George's, be a committee to make such arrangements as may be necessary for the interment of the honorable James Brooke, a delegate from Kent county, who died on the 24th of January last.

On motion by Mr. Semmes, the following was read assented to and sent to the senate. By the house of Delegates, Feb 2d, 1822. Gentlemen of the senate.

In the discharge of a melancholy duty we inform you of the decease of James Brooke Esq. late a delegate from Kent county, and a member of this House. As a testimonial of respect to his memory, we propose that the members of both branches of the Legislature convene to-morrow evening at 3 o'clock, to join in procession at his funeral.

By order, JOHN BREWER, Clk. On motion by Mr. Semmes, the following was read, assented to and sent to the senate. Resolved, That the Legislature, in respect to the memory of the late James Brooke Esq. deceased, a delegate from Kent county, who departed this life, be attending to the discharge of his duties, wear scarfs and bands during the remainder of the Session, and that the funeral expenses be placed on the Journal of accounts.

The clerk of the senate returns the said resolution endorsed, assented to, and the following message: By the Senate Feb 2d, 1822. Gentlemen of the house of delegates. We concur in your proposal that the members of both branches of the Legislature, convene to-morrow evening at 3 o'clock, to join in procession at the funeral of James Brooke Esq. late a member of your house, from Kent county.

By order, W. KILTY, Clk. Monday, Feb. 4. Mr. J. S. Spence reports unfavourably on the petition of sundry inhabitants of the State relative to a circulating medium. A petition from sundry inhabitants of Somerset and Worcester counties, for a change of the time of holding the courts in said counties.

A memorial from the trustees of the Baltimore College, for a donation of a lottery for the benefit of the same. Thursday, Jan 31. The bills to make valid a deed therein mentioned; appointing commissioners for the regulation and improvement of the village of Hillsborough; the resolution in favour of Solomon Peters; the supplement to the act to establish a patrol in St. Mary's; the bill to appoint commissioners for the purpose of clearing the division line between the 1st and 4th election districts in Allegany; the supplement to the act for the distribution of the free school fund; the resolution of the state to subscribe \$100,000 to the Bank of Baltimore, were generally passed and sent to the senate.

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The clerk of the senate returns the bill to amend and reduce the duties on the importation of goods, and the further supplement to the act to provide for the opening and extension of Pratt street in the city of Baltimore.

Friday, Feb. 5. A petition from Washington Mitchell, of Anne Arundel for a support. On motion of Mr. Dorsey, Ordered, That the clerk of the western shore reports for the use of this house, the disbursements made by the state on account of the penitentiary, showing the sum expended for the original purchase thereof, for the improvements made thereon, for the rebuilding of a part thereof, for the payment of the debts due therefrom, for the annual payments to the officers connected with the said institution, and likewise a statement of the receipts into the treasury from the said institution, if any.

The report on the memorial of Charles Browning was concurred with. The clerk of the senate returns the bill to alter the constitution as relates to the division of Anne Arundel into election districts—passed.

The bill authorizing a loan, was read, amended, passed, and sent to senate. Mr. Bruce reports a bill for the appointment of an Agent.

The house proceeded to the second reading of the bill to provide for the appointment of inspectors of flour in the city of Baltimore. Mr. Barney moved to strike out the first clause giving the appointment of inspectors to the Executive, after spending some time in reading testimony taken in virtue of an order of the house, the house adjourned.

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After some further debate on the amendment, The question was taken on Mr. Johnson's motion to insert 41,500 as the ratio, and was decided in the negative, as follows: yeas 64—nays 114. Mr. Campbell, of Ohio, then moved that the bill be ordered to be engrossed and read a third time.

Mr. Randolph moved, simply to strike out 40,000—the number now in the bill, and leaving it to be filled by a future motion—and the question was ordered to be decided by yeas and nays. A motion was then, (about 1 o'clock,) made to adjourn, and was negatived—as a similar motion had previously been made.

The question was then taken on the motion to strike out, by yeas and nays, and was decided as follows: yeas 64—nays 112. Mr. Coke having declared that he voted yesterday with the majority on the question of striking out 40,000, and inserting 39,000, by which that motion was negatived—moved now to reconsider that question.

Another motion to adjourn was negatived. Mr. Edwards, of N. C. then renewed the motion to recommit the bill, with instructions to strike out 40,000, and insert 42,000—which motion he supported with some remarks. Mr. F. Jones opposed the motion at some length, expressing his preference of 43,000 to 42,000.

Mr. Edwards, for the purpose of allowing Mr. Coke's motion to be tried, with drew his motion to recommit. Some debate ensued on the motion of reconsideration, and on points of order—when another motion to adjourn prevailed, and at near 6 o'clock the house adjourned.

CANAL OF ALEXANDRIA. This grand Canal has received the name of Mahmud, in honour of the Sultan. It terminates a few feet from Pompey's Pillar, and begins at the Nile below Saine. It is 7,060 toises in length, 12 in breadth, and 3 in depth. It was begun in January, 1819, with 100,000 workmen—the number the next month was increased to 150,000. The pay of each man was a piastre per day. In May, 30,000 workmen from Upper Egypt were added to those already employed, and the canal was completed, Sept. 13th, 1820. The workers were directed by six European Engineers.

A machine for cutting boards, and otherwise rendering them fit for many uses, purposes, has been for some time in operation at Eldridge, in N. York state. The whole operation is performed by water—the wood is sawed to the proper length, cut into boards, then planed, morticed, moulding struck &c. All by the same machinery.

A deputation from the King of Foulah has arrived at Sierra Leone, among whom was a Mahomedan priest, who had journeyed by land from Egypt. He is said to have passed through Tombuctoo, and to be of the opinion, that the Nile and the Niger are one and the same river.
