Extract of a letter to a gentleman in Boston dated Fort Röyal, Martinique, Oct. 27.
"Before this reaches you, you will probably have heard of our negro insurrection which keeps us all under arms and in great anxiety. Those are the facts, and the scheme, fortunately for us, begun twenty four hours before the time agreed upon.

On the night of the 12th inst the negroes

On the night of the 12th inst, the negroes on the Heights of Carbet, a village this side of St. Pierre, joined and began with the murder of their masters. They succeeded with three families on different plantations, but before the interest the fourth, the alarm was spread and the murderers were put to flight. They were soon surrounded by the militia and regular troops from St. Pierre, and a stop was put to their diabolical work. From sixty-five to seventy of the confederation have been caught, and cal work. From sixty five to seventy of the confederation have been caught, and are under trial By their confession, many other negroes will be implicated in the plot.

Their plan was to murder all the whites and free mulattoes, and from Carbet, carrying destruction before them, to maich to St. Pierre, take possession of Battery St. Martha, fire a gun as a signal to the confederates in town to begin the slaughter, pillage, &c when they would be joined by the whole island, who were to follow their example. The 13th was the day fixed upon. They have no where opposed any resistance; a very few arms and little ammunition has been found.
