LEGISLATURE OF MARYLAND. Abstract of the Proceedings of THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES. Wednesday Jan. 22.

Mr. Riley reports a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Levin Sturgis, senior, of Worcester county.

Mr. Pollard reports a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Thomas J. Perry, late of Allegany county.

And Mr. H. Kemp reports a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of Adolphe V. Lowe, of Frederick county; which were read.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill for the relief of John Gardner, of Charles county, and the bill for the relief of John A. Batchelder, of Caroline county; severally endorsed "will not pass."

The bill to prevent bullet playing in Middleburgh in Frederick county, endorsed "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.

And the bill for the benefit of John Lane, of Frederick county, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Howard presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Anne Arundel county, praying for a sale of the alms-house, and power to purchase another situation.

Also a petition praying for a repeal of the law making the ferries public; read and referred.

Also a petition from Charles Carroll, of Carrollton, and others, of Anne Arundel county, praying a law may pass for opening a road from Barnes's rolling road to the Frederick turnpike road, in said county; read and referred.

Mr. Steele presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Dorchester county, for a road to Stack's Landing, and that the said landing be made public; read and referred.

Mr. Saulsbury presents a petition from George A. Smith, register of wills for Caroline county, praying compensation for completing the records of the late registry; read and referred.

Also a petition from sundry inhabitants of Caroline county, praying for the repeal of so much of the law which prevents swine going at large in Denton; read and referred.

On motion by Mr. Allen, ordered, That the further supplement to an act, entitled, An act relating to public roads in the several counties therein mentioned, passed at December session, 1821, chap. 153, have a second reading on the 5th February.

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act to repeal parts of the acts of assembly therein mentioned; and the bill to authorise the trustees of the poor of Cecil county to dispose of certain lands therein mentioned, and to purchase other lands, were read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

Thursday, Jan. 23. The bill to prevent trespasses in Allegany county, and the bill for the revaluation of real and personal property in Somerset county, were read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Anthony Addison and Henry A. Callis, endorsed "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.

And a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act concerning the chancery court, endorsed "will pass;" which was read.

Also the bill for the benefit of the heirs of Jesse H. Wainwright late of Somerset county, endorsed "will not pass."

And the bill to regulate a dangerous practice in the stone quarries on the falls turnpike road near Baltimore, endorsed "will pass with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read, assented to, and the bill ordered to be engrossed.

The house resumed the consideration of the unfinished business of yesterday, being the bill relative to civil rights and religious privileges, which was passed, yeas 40, nays 33.

The clerk of the senate delivers the bill authorizing the establishment of a ferry over Potomac river, from the lands of George Lafever, in Washington county, opposite the place called the Falling Water, in Virginia, endorsed "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.
