Extract from Poulson's American. MARCH.

This month is comparatively monotonous, with little, except storms, to vary the scene of the long struggle between Old Boreas and Mars, for the mastery. It is named from the latter drity. The God of War, who, according to the Roman Mythology, presided over it, and bears no small resemblance to the turbulence of his profession, With them, it was the first month of the year;with the Hebrews likewise, part of it formed a portion of their first month, called Abib, or Nioan.

March is well described by a wri ter in the Spectator, (probably Mr. Pope,) to whom, in a vision of the seasons, it thus appeared: "As March advanced towards me, there was, methought, in his look, a lowering roughness, which ill befitted a month which was ranked in so soft a season; but as he came forwards, his features became inscusibly more mild and gentle; lie smoothed his brow, and looked with so sweet a countenance that I could not but lament his departure, though he made way for April."

It commenced on Saturday, which derives its appelation from the Saxons, who, on this day, worshipped the idol Seator. And it is because the day's are thus denominated from the heathenish rites, that some object to the nomenclature and simply call them first day, second day, &c.

In this month our Presidents are inaugurated. Our chronology also reminds us that this month, 18. years ago, Bounaparte ascended one more step in his ambitious career, the Regency of Italy, which like all his glory, was short lived and unhappy.

The festival of Easter, commemorating the resurrection of our Saviour, is named from Eustre, a goddess, worshipped by the Saxons in April; the same festival is called by

the Greeks pages, and by the Jews, pascha, in allusion to their passover. It was formerly observed by different nations, at different times; but the Council of Nico decreed it should be kept on a particular day, and always occur on the Sabbath.

#### • , , === A Ficture of the State of Missouri. GRAND JURY PRESENT-MENT.

We, the Grand Jury, of the state of Missouri, impannelled for the county of Cade Girardeau, would present to our fellow citizens, the necessity of industry and economy in their private affairs; and regret to see in a state just emerging from a territorial government, so much idleness and dissipation, and the laws of our country too little respected both by individuals and officers.

As it respects the former, perhaps they are not so blameable, where men appointed by the government, and in whom special trust and confidence are reposed, wink, nay even shut their eyes, to the transgression of the law. . .:

Persons not exercising the functions of government, are not to be viewed by the eye of morality, in the same degree of turpitude as men exercising these functions, tho it ought to be expected; and nothing can conduce to the establishment and permanency of good government so much as morality in the citizens without the exercise of the law: but all men have their, propensities, and where the law does not take hold of them (though perfect in itself.) though from the inattention of the officers, they should be strongly reprobated. In the instance of gambling, one of the most pernicious vices, it is not uncommon to see several persons assembled at the card table, and perhaps two the same offi support the laws and constitution of the state, which they daily violate. The peace officers are frequently witnesses of affrays in our streets, which they are bound by the law to take notice of, but lest they should lose (in the mercantile phrase) the selling of a few yards of tape, or in seeking popularity, lose two wates in apprehending the rioters, they suffer the same to pass with impu-

Sabbath breaking is a thisdemednour forbidden by our laws, but we think we may safely say, for five wars no notice has been taken of the same, and for that reason it is not uncommon to see on that day, that almost as much labour is done; as on those on which labour is not prohibited: Sunday is a time appointed not only by our law, But by the law of God, to he observed as a day of rest, but disregarding either, we have instances too frequently, of men fritiated certainly in their habits,) labouring equally on that day

as on any of the other six. We the Grand Jury, express our strong disapprobation of this conduct, and would observe to our fellow citizens, that to be six days industrious, - will lay up a good store,
