The Steam Boat

MARYLAND,

Commenced her regular routes on Saturday the 8th of March, at 8 o'clock A. M. from Commerce street wharf for Annapolis and Easton, leaving Annapolis at half past 12 o'clock for Easton, and on Sunday the 9th, will leave Easton, by way of Todd's Point, the same hour, for Annapolis and Baltimore; leaving Annapolis at half past 2 o'clock, and continue to leave the above places as follows:—Commerce street wharf, Baltimore, on Wednesday and Saturdays, and Easton on Sundays and Thursdays at 8 o'clock, till the first of November, and then leave the above places one hour sooner, so as to arrive before dark. Persons wishing to go from Easton to Oxford can be landed for fifty cents each, the same from Oxford to Easton. Passengers wishing to proceed to Philadelphia will be put on board the Union Line of steam-boats in the Patapsco river, and arrive there by 9 o'clock the next morning.

The Maryland commenced her route from Baltimore to Queen's-town & Chester town, on Monday, the 10th day of March, leaving Commerce street wharf at 9 o'clock every Monday, and Chester town every Tuesday at the same hour for Queen's-town & Baltimore; during the season—Horses and carriages will be taken on board from either of the above places—All baggage at the risk of the owners.

LONG YARNS.

This is a phrase generally used by seamen to denote species of marvellous stories with which they delight to while away the dreary "mid watch" and to astonish the wondering minds of such green horns or land lubbers as may happen to be on board. Amongst these nautical night tales, the most astonishing is that called "The Merry Dinn of Dover!" This was a vessel of such extraordinary magnitude that she has been known to receive a cargo of coals at her bow port in Sunderland harbour, and discharging them at the same time out of her stern port in the coal lighters below London Bridge. Such was the height of her masts, that a little boy being sent aloft to clear the pendant, he was so long ascending and descending that when he returned on deck he was become so old as to be grey headed. Working out of the Downs, this amazing ship was of such a length, that in tacking her flying jib-boom knocked down Calais steeple, at the very instant that the tail of her ensign swept a flock of sheep off the summit of Dover Cliff. The following is an enumeration of the different sails set upon her mainmast, beginning at the top—mainmast, topsail, top-gallant sail, royals, skyscraper, moon, raker, cloud disturber, heaven pucker, angel pucker, and jolly jumper.

DIocese of SOUTH CAROLINA.

The 35th annual Convention of the Protestant Episcopal Church in the Diocese of South Carolina, was held in this city on the 19th, 20th, and 21st, ult. Twenty two of the clergy and thirty five lay delegates attended. The church in this diocese consists of the Bishop, 27 Presbyters, 4 Deacons, and 35 organized Congregations.—The Right Rev. Bishop Bowen, is President of the Convention, and the Rev. Dr. Dalcho, Secretary and Treasurer. The Bishop's Permanent Fund amounts to \$8,053, and the common Fund, \$1,036.—During the past year \$976 had been collected for the General Theological Seminary, located in New York. The whole amount paid to this Seminary, by individuals in this diocese, was \$7,310, which entitles the Convention to the appointment of eight trustees. By the Parochial reports, it appears that the Marriages, the last year, were 91, Burials 199, Baptisms 299. Communicants 1684, (the number of Communicants from some of the churches not reported.) The Sunday Schools, in the Churches at Charleston, are represented as flourishing; and in Trinity Church, Columbia, there are 114 scholars, many of whom walk from three to six miles, to attend the school. 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SEAMEN.

The following extract of a letter to the venerable Mr. Eastburn, Pastor of the Mariner's church in Philadelphia, is merely a specimen of the communications, which he is in the habit of receiving, from seamen who have enjoyed the benefits of his ministry. Ship Jane, outward bound, Jan. 5, 1823.

"Reverend Friend—With serious pleasure we embrace the opportunity of returning our warmest thanks to you for the many tokens of your labours of love towards us, as respects the salvation of our souls. We sincerely wish that your labours may not have been in vain in the Lord; that the warnings we have had, to flee from the wrath to come, may have an everlasting impression upon us. We hope the seed you are endeavouring to sow may fall in good ground, and bring forth fruit to the praise and glory of God our Saviour in all things; that the Lord Jesus Christ may be established in the hearts of all those who go down to the sea in ships, where we see the works of the Lord, and his wonders in the deep.

Oh that all who love the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity and truth, would pray for the salvation and safety of all mariners, as well as for pagans, Jews, and others; that they would remember that it was through the instrumentality of sailors across the Atlantic to shine in our happy country, where none dares to lest or make us afraid. We know that the Lord will be merciful to all those who call upon him in sincerity and truth through our Lord Jesus Christ, whose blood cleanseth from all sin; but we cannot know this a right without the teaching of the Holy Spirit; if so oh pray for us, dear friend, for the effectual fervent prayer of the righteous availeth much.

We firmly believe it is the desire of all the crew to fulfil the ninth part of the 119th Psalm, (Dr. Watts') There has been no profane language used by any on board, since we left Philadelphia. We sincerely hope the Lord may give you health and strength to carry on the work you have begun, the good effects of which we have already witnessed."

Signed by the crew of ship Jane. Another crew requested the prayers of the church, not only for their safety, but that their hearts may be changed and lifted up to the Lord in gratitude for his goodness to them. A captain of one of these ships, when just casting off the fasts, said to a gentleman standing by: "See, every man is now on board, sober and attentive. This is the effect of the Mariner's Church, and if I was not afraid Mr. E. would publish my letter, I would write to him and let him know the change I behold among the sailors. They say they have knocked off swearing, and knocked off getting drunk, and attended to the Bible and good tracts."

Every man is at liberty to speak what he pleases against the people; but against princes or ministers, no man can talk without a thousand apprehensions and dangers.
