When questioned by the commanding officer respecting the cause of this violent conduct, he said that during the last war he had REMARKABLE STORY. duct, he said that during the last war he had been taken prisoner by a party of Guerillas, and that a sort of Military Council, at which this individual Monk presided, had subse-quently condemned him to the horrible death of crue fixt on, from which he was only preserved by the opportune approach of a party of French troops. The officer then exhibited one of his hands, to show by s scar which remained, that the dreadful work of torture had actually commenced. It was found necessary, in consequence of this explanation, to overlook the act of aggression committed on the Monk.
