A FLOATING-ISLAND.

When the meadow is overflowed, by means of an artificial dam, this island rises with the water, which is some times six feet. Near the middle of this island is a small pond, which has been gradually increasing ever since it was known, and is now almost covered with verdure. In this place a pole fifty feet long has disappeared, without finding bottom. In the water of that pond, there have been fish in plenty, which, when the meadow has been overflowed, have appeared there, and when the water has been drawn off, have been left on the meadow, at which time the island settles to its usual place."

City Affairs.
THE MAYOR'S MESSAGE.
In compliance with his duty, the Mayor now returns to the Corporation with the Treasurer's report, particularly specifying the items of receipts and expenditures from January 1822, to this period; and the items from April last to this time, would have accompanied this report, if the account rendered by the late Treasurer had not been referred to a committee, and finally adjusted, agreeably to the report made, it will be with the board, it deemed requisite, to take the necessary steps to furnish the citizens with the particulars, the amount only being included in the present Treasurer's account for the above period from April to November, 1822, the Treasurer's statement will make known the amount due to and from the Corporation; and as the subject will be referred to a committee, the Mayor deems it unnecessary to give his impressions of this time to the finances of the city.
The Mayor considers it his duty to state that the Police of the city is too much weakened, within the last few months, by the discontinuance of, or from reducing the number of city constables, from which period the city appears to have relaxed into its former propensities, by indulging in riots and noise by night, and gambling on sabbath, and other days, to the annoyance of sundry parts of the city. And as the citizens pay a large tax for their safety and comfort, it is for the people, above all representatives of the corporation, to decide whether there shall be any addition or deduction, made to the number of constables, whose duty it will be to suppress the evils aforesaid, and to grow and loudly complained of.

The committee to whom was referred the annual communication of the Mayor, with the Treasurer's Account of Receipts and Disbursements up to the first Monday in April last, and also a Statement of Debts due to and by the Corporation to the same time, beg leave to report—that they have examined and compared the several items in said Treasurer's account of receipts and expenditures, with the books, and have found said statements substantially correct. In respect to the account handed in by the late Treasurer, and referred to by the Mayor in his communication, your committee enquiring on that occasion was directed to ascertain how his account with the Corporation stood, to the end that his bond might be given up, and what appeared to be fairly due him as Treasurer, which your committee did ascertain, and beg leave to refer to that report. As to the account alleged to have found the aggregate amount to correspond with the present Treasurer's report, of course it did not appear necessary to give a detailed statement. Your committee have made some corrections in the Treasurer's statement of debts due the Corporation. In his statement, Isaac Holland late collector, is charged with \$289 56 1/4 of his collection of 1820. A reference to the proceedings of the 7th June 1821, will shew, as well as other testimony before your committee, that Mr. Holland does not owe any thing on the collection of that year; your committee have closed his account on the books accordingly, of that year. By his account, a copy of which accompanies this report, Mr. Holland owes the Corporation a balance of his collection of 1821, of \$513 76 1/4, which amount he ought to close as soon as possible. Your committee also made a correction of 70 1/2 cents standing against John Waters, which Mr. Waters satisfied one of your committee he did not owe. With those amendments, your committee believe the statement of debts due the Corporation correct, having reduced the aggregate \$646 05 3/4, and leaving the balance of \$935 60 1/2 due. Your committee would earnestly request the Corporation to take immediate means to its recovery, as many of the items, if neglected, will be jeopardised by delay, and certainly our situation does not admit of indulgence, having some pressing and indispensable claims on us to meet, as well as to carry on a progressive improvement of our city. Two items your committee will notice in this statement as unavailable, if not paid. Francis Welch, with interest, about \$400. R. D. Baldwin, with do about \$50—total \$450. Deduct this, and the aggregate will be available \$915—Your committee submit herewith a statement, showing what demands may be necessary to provide for in the current year's appropriations, and what available means we have to meet them. In this statement your committee have not admitted any claim which they think will not be made good, but have put down what may be considered certain means. They would recommend an order directing the Treasurer to proceed directly to recover the debts of Messrs. B. B. Brewer for \$150, J. Randall & Son for \$570, R. I. Jones \$200, total \$920—as well as \$140, and place the same to the payment of \$140 of the debt due the Farmers Bank of Maryland. Your committee would also suggest the propriety of appointing a standing committee of claims, who in all cases of debts claimed by creditors of this Corporation, who have also unsettled accounts on the Treasurer's books unsettled, should proceed in assisting the Treasurer to adjust and audit their several accounts, and report the result of their deliberations to this board, that they may finally settle the same. This it is (conceived by your committee) will insure a more certain mode of adjustment, and knowledge of accounts, than has been possible for us to have by statements of our resources, a knowledge, without which nothing can be fairly realised, and will open a clear view of our finances, and prevent that derangement of accounts in the treasury, which has prevented the appearing of the annual statements at the usual time, and ensure a regular system of organised settlement, supported by vouchers. This subject your committee would respectfully press on the consideration of the Corporation. In respect to the Police of the city, your committee, and respectable standing, could be obtained, and give them \$80 per annum each, who should at all times, by night as well as by day, patrol the city, and particularly on the Sabbath; and that their salary should be made payable quarterly yearly, by an order from the Mayor to him, they should weekly report, and be accountable for the peace of the city. But when your committee view their fellow citizens, with respect to having this service performed, as it should be to our city, they confess themselves under conviction that it would be extremely difficult to find men possessing the necessary qualifications. All of which is respectfully submitted.
