BY LAW,
To prevent the practice of Swimming and Bathing in the Basin.
Section 1. Be it established and ordained by the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen and Common Council of the City of Annapolis, and by the authority of the same, That it shall not be lawful for any person to bathe or swim in the Dock or Basin, or to expose himself naked on any of the wharves, under the penalty of five dollars for every such offence, to be recovered as other fines and penalties now are.

2. Be it established and ordained by the authority aforesaid, That if any person so offending be a slave, he shall be punished at the discretion of the Mayor, Recorder or any of the Aldermen, by any number of stripes not exceeding thirty nine.

3. And be it established and ordained by the authority aforesaid, That if any person so offending be a minor, or unable to pay the said penalty, the Mayor, Recorder or any one of the Aldermen, shall have full power and authority to commit such person to prison for a term not exceeding twenty days, for each and every such offence; Provided always, That in case of the conviction of any slave, or minor, of said offence, the whipping or imprisonment shall not be inflicted, if the owner of the slave or the parent, if the owner, master, or mistress of the minor, shall pay to the treasurer of the corporation the sum of five dollars for each offence.
