Francis Belmear and George An drews, of the fourth district, in the county aforesaid, and Richard Ridgely. Thomas Burgess and Henry Willing, of the fifth dis trict of the county atorecaid, be, and they are hereby authorised and appointed, or a ma-jority of them, comm ssioners to lay off and divide anew the fourth and fifh election districts, or the fifth election district only, which everthey shall deem will tend most to the convenience of the voters in said districts in Anne-Arundel county, into not exceed-ing three separate election districts in case they shall deem it most advisable to divide and lay off the fourth and fif h districts as aforesaid; and in case they shall deem it most advisable to divide and lay off anew. the fifth district only, they shall not divide nor lay it off into more than two separate election districts, carefully making the districts so as aforesaid to be laid off as nearly equal as possible, having regard to the population, extent and convenience of the opulation, extent and convention, and said ofters of each of said districts, and said off anew, election district or districts, so laid off anew, shall be numbered (if the fourth and fifth districts are divided) four, five and six, if only the fifth district shall be divided anew, they shall be numbered five and six, by the by such numbers; and also to make choice of a place in each district so laid off anew, at which the elections shall be held, as nearat which the elections shall be held, as nearly central as practicable, having regard to the eircumstances as aforesaid, and the accommodation of persons attendant upon such elections; and the said commissioners shall, on or before the third Moddy in April, eighteen hundred and twenty-four, deliver to the clerk of Anne Arundel country court, a description in writing under ty court, a description in writing, under their hands and seals, specifying plainly the boundaries and number of each district, and also the place in each district, where the election for such district shall be held, and the said clerk shall record the same in

this state, it is declared othat it is the duty of every man to worship God in such man Her as he thinks most acceptable to him And whereas, by the constitution of the U nited States, which is the supreme law of the land, it is declared that one religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust under the United States: And Shercas, certain cluzens of Manyland are deprived of civil rights and rendered incarable of holding offices on account of their religious principles; there

Sect 1 Be it enacted by the Genera Assembly of Maryland, That no religious test shall ever be required as a qualification to any office or public trust, under the state

And that electors of the enate, and all executive and judicial officers, he cre they act as such, and all persons elected or appointed to any office o profit or trust, civil or military, before en tering upon the doties thereof, shall respec tively take and subscribe the tollowing oath or affirmation, to w.t. B do swear or afficin, as the case may be,) that I will be latiful and bear true allegiance to the state of Maryland, and that I will support the constitution and laws thereof, and that I will to the best of my skill and judgment. diligently and faithfully, without partiality or prejudice execute the office of —, according to the constitution and laws of this state

from Commerce street wharf for Amapolis and Easton, leaving Annapolis at half past 12 o'clock for Easton, and on Sunday the 9th, will leave Easton, by way of Todd's Point. the same hour, for Annapolis and Baltimore; leaving Annapolis at half past 2 o'clock, and continue to leave the above places as follows:-Commercestreet wharf, Baltimore, on Wednesdays and Saturdays, and Easton on Sundays and Thursdays at 8 o'clock, till the first of November, and then leave the above places one hour sooner, so as to arrive before dark. Persons wishing to go from Easton to Oxford can be landed for fifty cents each, the same from Oxford to Easton. Passen gers wishing to proceed to Philadel phia will be put on board the Union Line of steam-boats in the Patapseo river, and arrive there by 9 o'clock

the next morning.
The Maryland commenced her route from Baltimore to Queen's-town & Chester town, on Monday, the 10th day of March, leaving Commerce-street wharf at 9 o'clock every Monday, and Chester town every Tuesday at the same hour for Queen's town & Baltimore during the season-Horses and carriages will be taken on board from either of the above places-All
