Prepare your ground as fine as possible; sow ball a bushel of seed to the aere, and harrow it on lightly. If your object is to preserve the seed, let it stand until the head becomes yellow; the stem and blades will nevertheless remain almost perfectly green. If it is designed for bay, cut it when the seed has formed, but before the head has turned yellow. On first coming up, it much resembles young crab grass, and is somewhat tedious in taking a good start, say two or three weeks; but alterwards the growth faver, rapid.
