Upon a new and Improved Plan.

The Editor of the Maryland Gazette, de signs making a considerable change in the plan and character of his paper. The rea sons which induce him to adopt this mea. sure are various, and they shall be briefly The Maryland Gazette was established in

the year 1745, by one of the ancestors of the present editor. It was preceded in its publication, but by three other papers on this Continent, all of which it has survived. It is therefore at present the oldest pa-per in America. From the period of its es-tablishment, until the year 1813, it preserv-ed the same character, and the same title; anterior to this period, it was strictly a vehicle of general intelligence—it was not devo ed to the views and objects of any particular party, but its columns were accessible to all. At the commencement of that year (a most momen ous period in the his-tory of our country,) it was deemed neces-sary to give to it a new character; and the be ter to designate its future course, an additional title also; it was henceforward called the Maryland Gazette and Political Intelligencer. At this period great political excitement prevailed, and party spirit raged with uncontrolled violence four country men were divided into two grat parties—the one approving, the other condemning the measures of the general government. Being forced by this state of things to take a part in the political contests of the day, the editor, after the maturest deliberation, and with the fullest conviction obtains under standing, resolved to advocate, exclusively, that policy which was recommended by the better to designate its future course, an ad

that policy which was recommended by the tederal party. If he differed from a majority of him eduntrymen, he differed from est. ly; and whether his views and sentiments were erroneous or not, they were the dic tates of the purest patriotism, and proceed-ed from an ardent desire to promote, what he conceived to be, the best interests of his country But these scenes have passed away
—times have changed —& the situation of our
country is now very different. We are in the full enjoyment of almost every national blessing—we are not only exempt from the horrors of war, but we are every where blessed with plenty and abundance. Our commerce, our agriculture, and our manufactures are comparatively flourishing—lar more so perhaps than in any other quarter of the globe. But above all, the demon of party spirit is now laid, and we trust for ever; the vera of good teelings. has now, we hope, indeed arrived, when the only contest will be, who can do his country most service; and when in appointment to office, service; and when in appointment to office, the only questions asked will be, Is he honest? Is he capable? Is he victuous?" To Mr Monroe much praise must be accorded for that state of harmony, which has for some time past pervaded our country—so wise has been the course of policy that he has pursued, that he has satisfied all parties, and left us nothing to disp te about. So great then has been the change of circum—stances which a few years have produced, put only in our own country, but in Eunot only in our own country, but in Europe also that the Editor deems it no longer necessary to continue his paper as the advocate of any particular political party. Its columns will henceforth be open to all who may choose to avail them elves of them, without any other restrictions than requir ing decency of language, the avoiding of personalities, and correctness of composition. But it will be the peculiar object of the Editor to render his paper subservient to the best interests of his own state—He wishes to make it emphatically a State Pawishes to make it emphatically a State Paper By this expression, he means a paper, whose province it will beto uphold and maintain the honour and dignity of the state—to promote her prosperity by diffusing such information with regard to her resources and her means of internal improvement, as he may he enabled to obtain As an indication of the future character of his paper, he has given to it, the new title

As an indication of the future character of his paper, he has given to it the new title of Vate Register. It will infuture become the repository of all state documents, and of such other information as may tend to elucidate the history of the state, or promote its improvement and prosperity.

It will also be the object of the Editor to present his patrons with the earliest intelligence, foreign or domestic; and he will be particularly careful to devote a due portion of his paper to the inverests of Agriculture, Manufactures, and Domestic Economy.

With this statement of his objects and his views, the Editor submits his plan to the patronage of the public.—Should it be favoured with their support, he will endeavour not to disappoint the expectation that may be excited.
