THE MARYLAND GAZETTE AND STATE REGISTER.

On a new and improved plan. The Editor of the Maryland Gazette, designs making a considerable change in the plan and character of his paper. The reasons which induce him to adopt this measure are various, and they shall be briefly stated.

The Maryland Gazette was established in the year 1775, by one of the ancestors of the present Editor. It was succeeded in its publication, but by which it has survived. It is the oldest paper in the United States. From the period of its establishment, until the year 1813, it preserved the same character, and the same title; anterior to this period, it was strictly a vehicle of general intelligence—it was not devoted to the views and objects of any particular party, but its columns were accessible to all. At the commencement of that year (a most momentous period in the history of our country,) it was deemed necessary to give it a new character; and the better to designate its future course, an additional title also, it was henceforward called the Maryland Gazette and Political Intelligence.

At this period great political excitement prevailed, and party spirit raged with uncontrolled violence—our countrymen were divided into two great parties—the one approving of the general government, the measures of which they took a part in the political contests of the day, the editor, after the maturest deliberation, and with the fullest conviction of his under standing, resolved to advocate, exclusively, that policy which was recommended by the great majority of the people.

It is not the views of the Editor, which were erroneous or no; they were the dictates of the purest patriotism, and proceeded from an ardent desire to promote, what he conceived to be the best interests of his country. But these errors have passed away, and times have changed—the situation of our country is now very different.

We are in the full enjoyment of almost every national blessing—we are not exempt from the horrors of war, but we are every where blessed with plenty and abundance. Our commerce, our agriculture, and our manufactures are comparatively flourishing—far more so perhaps than in any other quarter of the globe. But above all, the demon of party spirit is now laid, and we trust for ever; the "era of good feelings" has now, we hope, indeed arrived, when the only contest will be, who can do his country most service; and when in appointment to office, the only questions asked will be, Is he honest? Is he capable? Is he virtuous?

To Mr. Munroe much praise must be accorded for that state of harmony, which has for some time pervaded our country—so wise has been the course of policy that he has pursued, that he has satisfied all parties, and left us nothing to dispute about. So great then has been the change of circumstances which a few years have produced, not only in our own country, but in Europe also, that the Editor deems it no longer necessary to continue his paper as the advocate of any particular political party.

Its columns will henceforth be open to all who may choose to avail themselves of them, without any other restrictions than requiring decency of language, the avoiding of personalities, and correctness of composition. But it will be the peculiar object of the Editor to render his paper subservient to the best interests of his own state—He wishes to make it emphatically a State Paper. By this expression, he means a paper and whose province it will be to uphold and maintain the honour and dignity of the state—to promote her prosperity, by diffusing such information with regard to her resources and she may be enabled to obtain, as an indication of the future character of his paper, he has given to it the new title of State Register. It will in future become the repository of all state documents, and of such other information as may tend to elucidate the history of the state, or promote its improvement and prosperity.

It will also be the object of the Editor to present his patrons with the earliest intelligence, foreign or domestic; and he will be particularly careful to devote a portion of his paper to the interests of Agriculture, Manufactures, and Domestic Economy.

With this statement of his objects and his plan, the Editor submits his plan to the patronage of the public—Should it be patronized with their support, he will endeavour not to disappoint the expectation that may be excited.

If sufficient encouragement be afforded, the paper will be enlarged to an imperial size, and printed with a new type.
