From the period of its establishment, antil the year 1813, it preserved the same character, and the same title; anterior to this period, it was strictly a vehicle of general intelligence—it was not devoed to the views and objects of any particular party, but its columns were accessible to all. At the commencement of that year (a most mementous period in the history of our country.) it was deemed necessary to give to itla new character; and the better to designate its future course, an additional title also; it was henceforward called the Maryland Gazette and Political Intelligence. At his period great political excitement prevaled, and party aprit raged with mecontroled violence—our country men were divided into two great partics—the one approving, the other condemning the measures of the general government. Being lorced by this state of this give take a part in the political contests of the day, the editor, after the maturest deliberation, and with the fullest conviction of his under standing, resolved to advocate, exclusively, that policy which was recommended by the were erroneous or not, they were the dictates of the purest particism, and proceeded from an ardent desirt to promote, what he conceived to be the sest interests of his country. Its columns will henceforth be open to all who may choose to wait themselves of them, without any other restrictions than requiring decency of language, the avoiding of personalities, and correctnes of composition. But it will be the pectular object of the Editor to render his pape subservient to the best interests of his own state—He wishes to make it emphaticall a State Paper By this expression, he means a paper, whose province it will be to opioid and maintain the honour and dignity of the state—to promote her prosperit by diffusing such information with reserved to her resource and her means of iternal improvement, as he may be enable to obtain. As an indication of the future character of his paper he has given to it the new title of state Register. It will infuture become the repository of all state documents, and of such other information as may tend to elucidate the history of the stat, or promote its improvement and prosecuty—It will also be the object of the Editor to present his patrons with the earliest intelligence, foreign or domestic; and he will be particularly careful to devote a ne portion of his paper to the interests of griculture, Manufactures, and Domestic Leonomy.
