It is quite possible, indeed, by making them a principal part of a meal, to prevent, in a great measure, the irritation and heat which produces the hacking and distressfluctually in the more advanced stage of consumption. When too many oysters have been incautiously eaten, and are felt lying cold and heavy on the stomach, we have an intallible and immediate semedy in hot milk of which half a pint may be drank, and it will quickly dissolve the oysters into a bland, creamy jelly. Weak and consumptive persons should always take this after their meal of oysters.
