A SUPPLEMENT to an act, entitled An act to regulate and discipline the Mi-litia of this State.
[Passed December Session, 1823]

Sec. 1. Be it enacted, by the General Assembly of Maryland, That each and every commandant of a regi ment, or extra battalion, is hereby required, under the penalty of fitty dollars for every neglect or refusa in each and every year hereafter, to order two meetings of all the com missioned officers attached to his regi ment or extra battalion, at some central place thereof, on such days as are hereafter provided for by this act, and there drill and instruct, or cause said officers to be drilled and instructed, in all the necessary duties of a soldier, and to adopt the manocuvres and discipline as establish ed for the army of the United States; and any field officer neglecting or re fusing to attend any of said meetings shall be fined in a sum not exceeding twenty dollars, nor less than five dol lars, (at the discretion of a brigade court martial) for every such neglect, unless he can give a reasonable ex cuse; and any company or staff officer neglecting or refusing to attend any of said meetings, shall be fined, at the discretion of a regimental or extra battalion court martial, in a sum not exceeding ten dollars nor less than two dollars; for every such ne glect, unless he can give a reasonable excuses and all officers, who hy this section are required to attend said

meetings, shall appear in uniform, and with side arms, under a penalty of five dollars for every neglect or refusal: which fines and forfeitures similar nature are directed to be collected by the act to which this is a supplement, and shall be paid over to respective paymasters of the regi ments and extra battalions, to which such delinquents shall belong.
Sec 2. And be it enacted, That the

time of meeting for the commissioned officers of regiments or extra battalion the second Saturday in April and August annually, at ten o'clock, A. M For the battalion musters on the third Saturday in May for the first battalion, and the fourth Saturday in May for the second bat talion, annually, at ten o'clock, A. M.

Sec. 3. And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of every comman dant of a company to cause to be de livered, on or before the first day of April annually, to every person in his ompany district subject to militia duty, a written or printed notice of the time and place of the company meetings, and company courts-mar tial, for the ensuing year, and this shall be considered due and sufficient notice; and any private neglecting or refusing to attend such meetings, af ter such due notice given him, shall be fined in a sum not exceeding two dollars, nor less than fifty cents, (at the discretion of a company courtmartial,) for every such neglect or refusal.

Sec. 4. And be it enacted, That the fines and forfeitures imposed by company court-martial, when collected shall be applied, under the direction of the companies, to and for the use of the respective companies in which the same may be collected, and that in no case shall the commandants of companies remit the fines imposed by such

courts-martial. Sec. 5. And be it enacted. That upon the nonpayment of any fine or forfeiture imposed by this act, or the act to which this is a supplement, by any person or delinquent, it shall be the duty of the constable of the district or hundred wherein such delinquent resides, after thirty days notice given to such delinquent, which notice shall be given by such constable within thirty days after he shall have received such fine or forfeiture for collection, to col lect the same by warrant and judg-ment from any justice of the peace of the county wherein the parties may

Sec. 6. And be it enacted. That it shall be the duty of the commanders of companies of infantry and cavalry. to make out a complete return of all the officers and men, and the condition and number of their arms and equipmenta belonging to the state, within his district, subject to do militia duty un. der his command, annually, on or before the twentieth day of October, and to deliver the same to the commanders of battalions or extra battalions of infantry, or squadrons of cavalry, as the case may be, and on refusal or neglect to do the same, shall be cashiered, or punished by fine not exceeding thirty dollars, at the discretion of a regimental court martial. and it shall be the duty of the com-

manders of such battalions or exten battalions of intentry, or squadrons or cavalry, as the case may be, to make out and deliver to the commanders of regiments to which they are attack or belong, annually, on or before the first day of November, a complete return of all the officers and men under their commands within their districts, and the condition and number of their arms and equipments belonging to the state; and on refusal or neglect to do the same as herein directed, shall be cashiered, or punished by fine not ex-ceeding fifty dollars, at the discretion of a brigade pourt martial.

Bec. 7 And be it enacted, That ie shall be the duty of the commanders of regiments within this state, both infantry and cavalry, to make out and deliver to the brigadier general commanding the district to which they belong, annually, on or before the tenth day of November, a complete and full return of all the officers and men, and the condition and number of their arms and equipments belonging to the state, under their command, and on neglect or refusal to do the same, he shall be cashiered, or punished by fine not exceeding one hundred dollars, at the discretion of a brigade court martial, and it shall be the duty of the brigadier general to make out a return of the same to the adjulant general of this state, on or before the first Mon.

day of December annually.

Sec 8 And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of the adjutant-general of this state, annually, to forward to each of the brigadier generals, colonels and majors of extra battalions, the blanks necessary to enable them to comply with the provisions of this act.

Sec. 9. And be it enac'ed, That the militia of Allegany county shall be exempt from the operations of this law only so far as is provided for by the twenty-ninth section of the militia law passed at November session 1811, and the supplement of 1817, chapter 136, and they shall also be exempt from the drilling of the officers as directed in The law.

Sec 10. And be it enacted, That all that part of the forty first section of the original act to which this is a upplement, which requires constahles to give bonds to the commanding officers of companies for the collection of fines and forfeitures imposed by company court-martials; be and the same is hereby repealed, and that all the provisions of said original act, which are repugnant to the provisions of this act. be and the same are hereby repealed.

11. And be it enacted. That any field officer hereafter removing out of the district of his regiment, with an intention of making a permanent change of his residence, shall on such removal be deemed to have reigned his commission and it shall be the brigadier general's duty, to make such vacancy known to the governor. and council as soon thereafter as convenieht.

Sec 12. And be it enacted, That it shall be the duty of each and every commissioned officer of this state, within six months from and after the passage of this act, to report himself to the adjutant-general, by etter post paid, and all officers who not so report themselves, shall be considered as having resigned their commissions, and shall be stricken from the rolls, provided this supplement shall have been published once a week for six weeks in all the news. papers of the state, and the National Intelligencer; and it shall be the duty of the clerk of the council to notify the commanders of regiments, and extra battalions, of the names of such officers who have been stricken from the rolls as this law directs.

Sec. 13. And be it enacted, That this act shall not be construed to extend to the militia of the city of Baltimore, nor shall any persons who are now attached to and in the habit of duty in any volunteer uniformed company in this state to liable to be en-rolled under the provisions of this act, as long as they continue in such uniform company.
