On the 12th of June an American hermaphrodite brig, laden with codes and in digo, from Laguayra to some port in the U-nited States, was boarded off the Mona by a pirate, and carried to one of the Mona Isla ands, wherethey forced the captain and crew the 15th June, a sloop from hence to Maya. gues with a merchant from Cabo Roxo, was chased by a row boat off Riocon, the buccancers came so near the sloop that Mr F. (the merchant) fired his pistol at them, after they had fired several muskets at the sloop; luckily he hat the fellow at the helm, who cried out to the men, that he was wounded, and must return on shore.
Which they did, and the sloop escaped.

o'This information, and another that goods were smuggled on shoreat night, induced the colonel, who commands the troops stationed from Ponce to Arecibo, to engage a small vessel, which with 20 men & an officer, he sent in quest of the pirates. They soon saw a sloop which they gave chare to. Seeing they could not escape, the pirates run the sloop on shore, on one, of the Mona islands, and run in the bushes. The soldiers followed them; they stood to defeud themselves, when the second in command, a Portuguese named Gofreio, lost his hand and got a mortal wound in his head, of which hedied. Six have been made prisoners, whom with the dead Portuguetie they look to Mayagues. ARRIVAL OF GEN. LA FAYETTE.

We have great pleasure in announcing the safe arrival at this port of General LA FAYETTE, accompanied by his son, GEORGE WASHINGTON LA FAYETTE, Mr. AUGUSTE LE VISSEUR, a companion, and one servant. They arrived here yesterday morning in the ship Cadinus, Capt Allyn, after a plea-sant passage of 31 days from Havre. The fact of his arrival was made known by the Telegraph at an early hour, and it spread through the city with electrical rapidity. Broadway was soon thronged and the Battery crowded with people, who sallied forth with the expectation that the Hero and veteran of two revolutions, might come directly to the city, The arrangements of our city authorities, however, for his reception, having been seasonably com municated to him, he landed at Staten Island, and was conducted to the seat of the Vice President, where he remained through the day and passed the night. Fort La Fayette fired a salute as the ship passed, and a handsome salute was fired as the General landed, from the ship Importer, capt. Kean. from Canton, owned by Mr. T. H. Smith, lying at Quarantine.

In the city the national flag was immediately hoisted and displayed at all the public places during the day.

At 11 o'clock, a steam boat procee ded to Staten Island, with Gen. Morton, and several members of the Com mon Council, to greet his arrival, and communicate informally, the arrange-ments that have been made. The General received company during the greater part of the day. Col. Platt, who was in his suite during the Revolution, officiated to receive and introduce visitors, but in many instances, the General unrestrained by the ordinary rules of etiquette, was as anxious as his visitors were to crowd forward & grasp it

This day will present one of the most brilliant displays ever witnessed in New-York. The Military will parade at an early hour, and be in readi ness at the Battery to receive the General, who will be waited upon at Staten Island, and accompanied up to the city by a committee of the Corpora-For the accommodation of the committee, the Chancellor Livingston steam boat has been volunteered by the North River Company, and will be accompanied by four other steam boats all richly decorated.

It is expected the General will land at the Battery between 12 and 1 o'clock, whence he will be escorted to the City Hall, where he will be formally received by the Mayor and Common Council, and receive the marching salute of the troops in front of the Hall; after which he will be conducted to the apartments prepared for his reception at the

City Hotel. We feel proud of the reception which this early and devoted friend of American Liverty, and steadfast champion of the rights of man, will receive in our country, for while it will enkindle a patrioticardour and awaken many patriotic reflections among out countrymen, it will have a good effect abroad, and teach the enemies of freedom that one Republic at least is to be excepted from the sweeping declara-tion that all are ungrateful. - WEL-

MONTEGO BAY, (Jamaica,) July 16. CAPTURE OF PIRATES.—His Ma-jesty's schr. Lion, arrived here on Tuesday evening, and the Assiduous, with a piratical schooner, on Wednesday morning. We understand that on the 14th ult. the above vessels under the command of Captain Hobson, destroyed two piratical feluccas in the Palleson, on the coast of Principe. They are the same which plundered the sloop Endeavour, of this port; the crews had deserted them; and on the 26th, they also captured the above piratical schooner of S guns, in Cayo Briton. The crew of this vessel es-caped to the shore on the appearance of the men of war's boats, leaving seven American subjects on board, being the master and crew of the Martha Jane, belonging to Prospect, (State of Maine,) who had been taken by her on the 28th May near Trinidad. After a laborious search of ten days, chiefly through angrove Swamps, they succeeded in securing six of the pirates, and shooting two. There is every reason to suppose that those who have not been found have perished.
