A PROCLAMATION.
WHEREAS, the General As-
sembly of the state of Maryland, did by
an act passed at November session eigh-
teen hundred and five, entitled "An act
to reduce into one, the several acts of
Assembly, respecting elections, and to
regulate said elections;" Direct that the
Governor and Council, after having re-
ceived the returns of the elections for
electors to choose the President and
Vice President of the United States,
should enumerate and ascertain the
number of votes for each and every
candidate and person so as afore-
said voted for as an elector respec-
tively, and shall thereupon declare by
proclamation signed by the Governor,
and without delay disperse through the
state the name of the person or persons
duly elected as elector in each respec-
tive district.
We, in pursuance of the directions of
the said act, do, by this our proclama-
tion declare, that by the returns made
to us, it appears that Henry Brawner,
Esq. was elected for the first district;
John C. Herbert, Esq. was elected for the
