POPULATION OF GREECE.
The actual population of Greece, according to the most exact calculations, and taking a middle estimate between the different valuations which have been made, amount to four millions. Half live on terra firma; a million in the Morea and Negropont; and a million in the isles. This population, it is true, is composed of Greeks, Turks, Albanians, Jews and Franks; but it may be with certainty calculated that the true Greeks composed three-quarters of it; and in adding to them those who live in Asia, European Turkey, Russia, and Germany, the total population of the Greeks may still, without exaggeration, be rated at four millions. The population of ancient Greece was not more numerous.

LEGISLATURE OF MARYLAND.
PROCEEDINGS OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES.
WEDNESDAY, January 5, 1825.
Mr. Brown presents a petition from John Vance, of Caroline county, praying a change in his name; referred to Messrs. Brown, Bohn and Hardcastle.
And a petition from Elizabeth Carroll, of Caroline county, for a divorce; referred to the committee on petitions of a similar nature.
Mr. Farquhar presents a petition from Elizabeth Donnelly, widow of Patrick Donnelly; referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.
Mr. Howard presents a petition from Joseph Jameson, praying for the incorporation of the Baltimore Gun-Powder Company; referred to Messrs. Howard, Tyson and Merrick.
Mr. Rogerson presents a petition from Zephaniah Farran, of Charles county; referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.
Mr. Brown presents a petition from John Duggis, of Caroline county, praying for support; referred to the committee on similar petitions.
Mr. Howard presents a memorial from Marbury Parks, and others, praying for the incorporation of the United Beneficial Society of Baltimore; referred to Messrs. Howard, Tyson and Millard.
Mr. Speed obtains leave to bring in a supplement to the act, entitled, An act respecting writs of inquiry. Ordered, That Messrs. Speed, Wilson and Tingle report the same.
Mr. Merrick reports a bill, entitled, An act to alter and amend the constitution so as to allow to the city of Baltimore a representation equal to that of the several counties of this state.
Mr. Thomas presents a petition from Nixon Wilson, counter to the petitions of Thomas Wilson and Jacob Ayres; referred to the committee on insolvencies.
Arnold E. Jones, esquire, a delegate elect from Somerset county, appeared, qualified, and took his seat.

THURSDAY, January 6, 1825.
The speaker laid before the house reports from the clerks of Saint Mary's and Calvert counties, a report relative to the school funds for Cecil county, and a report from the trustees of Washington Academy, Somerset county.
Mr. Estep reports a bill, entitled, An act for the revaluation of real and personal property in Anne Arundel county.
Mr. Speed reports a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act respecting writs of inquiry. Ordered, That the same have a second reading on Tuesday next.
Mr. Garner presents a petition from Jane Scott, of Charles county, praying for support, referred to the committee on similar petitions.
Mr. Dennis presents a petition from Thomas Humphreys, praying for the sale of a lot of ground in the town of Salisbury, the property of a minor, for the benefit of said minor; referred to Messrs. Dennis, King and Jones.

FRIDAY, January 7, 1825.
The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The bill to change and alter the name of Thomas Gorrell, of Hannah, a minor, of Harford county, to Thomas Jeffery; and the bill to alter and change the name of John Vaine, of Caroline county, to John Clinton Cooper, were sent to the senate.
Mr. Worthington obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, A supplement to an act relating to coroners. Ordered, That Messrs. Worthington, Shower and Price, report the same.
Mr. Merrick reports a bill, entitled, An act to alter and amend the constitution so as to allow to the city of Baltimore a representation equal to that of the several counties of this state. Also a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of John W. Steinmetz, of Washington county. And a bill for the relief of Christian Brining, of Washington county.
Mr. Maxcy presents a petition from George Howard, of Anne Arundel county, praying to be relieved against the consequences that may result from a verdict lately rendered against him in Baltimore county court; referred to Messrs. Maxcy, Estep, Speed, M. Mahon and Kemp.
The bill annulling the marriage of Benjamin Cromwell, and Julia Ann Cromwell, of Baltimore county, was read the second time, passed, and sent to the senate.
Mr. Edelen presents a petition from Daniel and Walter Jenifer, praying for bounty land to which their father was entitled; referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.
Mr. Kemp reports a supplement to the act, entitled, An act authorizing and requiring the levy court of Frederick county to provide a suitable room for holding the orphans court of said county, and safe-keeping of the records and papers of said court.
The supplement to an act, entitled, A further additional supplement to the act for the distribution of a certain fund for the purpose of establishing free schools in the several counties therein named, was read the second time, amended, passed, and sent to the senate.
Mr. Travers presents a petition from Henry Nichols, collector of Dorchester county, to be relieved from the payment of interest on a debt due to the state; referred to the committee of ways and means.
Mr. Henderson delivers the following report:
The committee to whom was referred the petition of John S. Maffit, of Cecil county, have had the same under consideration, and beg leave to make the following report.—The petitioner states, that in the year eighteen hundred and twenty-one, he laid a warrant on a piece of land lying in said county, which he supposed to be vacant, and that he paid to the state two dollars and eighty six cents composition for the same, and one hundred and twenty dollars for improvements; that a caveat was filed, and an ejectment brought against him, by the owners of an adjoining tract of land called Colleton, and on locating said land, it covered all of the supposed vacancy, and judgment was entered against him in the ejectment, and the caveat ruled good in the land office. The petitioner prays that the money paid by him to the state may be refunded, and the prayer of the petitioner appearing reasonable, therefore,
Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby authorized, to pay to John S. Maffit, of Cecil county, or to his order, one hundred and twenty two dollars and eighty six cents.

On motion by Mr. Steele, Ordered, That the bill from the senate relative to attachments, have a second reading on Thursday next.
The resolution proposed by Mr. Teachin, relative to balances in the treasury, was read the second time and referred to the committee of ways and means.
On motion by Mr. Lee, Ordered, That the treasurer of the western shore do report to this house, as soon as may be, a statement of the situation of the different banks in which the state holds stocks, and to which she appoints directors, agreeably to the provisions in the several charters of said banks.
