LEGISLATURE OF MARYLAND.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE HOUSE OF DELEGATES.

WEDNESDAY, February 9, 1825.

Mr. Turner reports a bill, entitled, An act to repeal all such parts of the act, entitled, An act for the relief of real and personal property in the several counties of this state, as relate to the appointment of commissioners of the tax for Baltimore county.

THURSDAY, February 10, 1825.

The house met. Present the same members as on yesterday. The proceedings of yesterday were read. The supplement to an act to incorporate the trustees of the Franklin Academy or school in Baltimore county, and the bill for the benefit of Joseph Phillips of Cecil county, were sent to the senate.

Which was twice read and concurred with. Mr. Beall reports a bill, entitled, An act to repeal the 5th section of an act passed at November session 1775, chapter 29, relating to the commissioners of the tax for the several counties of this state, and of the city of Baltimore.

On motion by Mr. Millard, the following order was read: Whereas the Congress of the United States will, at the present session, pass laws to erect light houses at Point Look Out, at the mouth of the Potomac river, at Cedar Point, at the mouth of the Patuxent river, and whereas it is thought to be an object of great public utility, therefore resolved, that a committee, to consist of five, be appointed by the speaker, to report immediately, a bill to the United States, jurisdiction over so much land, at the respective points, as may be necessary for the erection of light houses.

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Mr. Beall presents a petition from Eleanor Jameson, and Mary Ann O'Neal, praying for a division of certain lands; referred to Messrs. Beall, Merrick and M'Mahon. On motion by Mr. Millard, the following resolution was read: Whereas, it is the wish of the good people of Maryland, to perpetuate the memory of those brave and illustrious heroes, who so nobly fought and bled in the defence of their country's rights: And whereas, it appears that the portrait of Washington, Lafayette, and Tishman, which now ornaments the wall of this house, is much defaced, therefore Resolved, That the governor be and he is hereby requested, to cause the portrait aforesaid to be repaired, and that he draw upon the treasury for such sums as may be necessary for said repair.
