The senate received your message with the bill, entitled, A supplement to an act, entitled, An act to lay out and make public two roads therein mentioned in Cecil county, passed at December session 1821, chap 127. The amendment to which, proposed by the senate, has been rejected by your house. How the amendment swould entirely defeat the bill," the senate are at a loss to conceive. The right of appeal is given by the amendment to the parties under the direction of the levy court of the county. The commissioners, from whose judgment of damages appeal may now be made, were named in the original law. This provision of the law differs from the law alterwards passed in 1821, chap. 152, which empowers the levy court to name the commissioners in the first instance. The senate are of opinion, that the levy court composed of seven judcious men taken from different parts of the county, are more solitable and proper to select an impartial and competent jury to ascertain the damages in this case, than a sheriff. And the senate cannot suppose that the object of the bill to be other than to obtain an impartial tribunal to assess the damages. The law, to which this is a supplement, though considered advantageous to the public, was particularly so to the individuals through whose lands these roads pass, by making mill and market more convenient and accessible, and no tribunal of appear, from the judgment of the cummissions. market more convenient and accessible, and no tribunal of appear, from the judgment of the commissioners, was provided, because it was believed that little or no daffiage would be required where such great advantages were obtained.
