Crane and deliver him to the sheriff, or in the jail of Anne Arundel county from which he made his escape; provided that the reward hereby offered, shall be in lieu of the same sum offered by William O'Hara, Esq. late sheriff of Anne Arundel county, upon the escape of said Crane.

These discussions are followed by the application of the preceding principles—to the Historical Interpretation of the Sacred Writings; the Interpretation of the Figurative Language of Scripture; the Spiritual Interpretation of the Scriptures; the Interpretation of Prophecy; of Types of the Doctrinal and Moral Parts of Scripture, of the Promises and Threatenings therein contained; and the Inferential and Practical Reading of the Sacred Writings.

Vol. III. contains an Outline of the Historical and Physical Geography of the Holy Land. The Political and Military Affairs of the Jewish and other Nations incidentally mentioned in the Scriptures. Sacred Antiquities of the Jews. The Domestic Antiquities, or Private Life, Manners, Customs, Amusements, &c. of the Jews and other nations incidentally mentioned in the Scriptures.

Vol. IV. is appropriated to the Analysis of Scripture.
