NEW POST-OFFICE LAW.

The National Intelligencer gives the following sketch of this law: "Members of Congress are to enjoy the privilege of franking for sixty days (instead of thirty) preceding and following each session of Congress. Printers are expressly authorized to send printed or written notes of their accounts to their subscribers, instead of being prosecuted therefor, as has been attempted. The punishment for robbery and embezzlement of letters is made somewhat more proportionate to the magnitude and enormity of the offence, not to speak of the punishment devised for undue curiosity, 'or prying into another's business.'"
