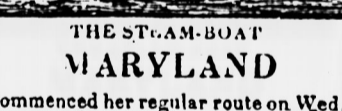
Ohio Lands.

There have been scarcely sales enough of this article since our last, to serve as an index to the state of the market; which, however, on the whole, appears to open favourably for tobacco of inferior and middling qualities.

It will be printed from the London Edition of 1823 in four very large octavo volumes; it will contain numerous maps and fac similes of biblical manuscripts, and in short every thing that is contained in that edition, and will be very neatly printed on good paper. The first London edition of this work was published in 1818, the second in 1821, the third in 1822, the fourth in 1823. These discussions are followed by the application of the preceding principles—to the Historical Interpretation of the Sacred Writings; the Interpretation of the Figurative Language of Scripture; the Spiritual Interpretation of the Scriptures; the Interpretation of Prophecy; of Types, of the Doctrinal and Moral Parts of Scripture, of the Promises and Threatenings there contained; and the Inferential and practical Reading of the Sacred Writings.

Vol. III. contains an Outline of the Historical and Physical Geography of the Holy Land. The Political and Military Affairs of the Jewish and other Nations incidentally mentioned in the Scriptures. Sacred Antiquities of the Jews. The Domestic Antiquities, or the Private Life, Manners, Customs, Amusements; &c of the Jews and other nations incidentally mentioned in the Scriptures.
