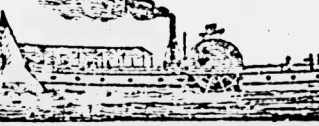

SAMUEL STEVENS, GOVERNOR OF MARYLAND, A Proclamation.

Whereas authentic information has been lodged in the Executive Department of the said state, that a horrible murder was committed on Monday the fourth day of April instant, in a road belonging to Captain John Cooper, near the Philadelphia and Baltimore post road, in Cecil county, to the body of EVELINA CUNNINGHAM, by a person or persons unknown. And whereas it is of the first importance to society, that perpetrators of such offences should be brought to condign punishment, I have thought proper to issue this my proclamation, and do, by and with the advice and consent of the council, offer a reward of THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS to any person or persons who shall apprehend and lodge in any jail, so as to be brought to justice, the person or persons who committed the above act.
