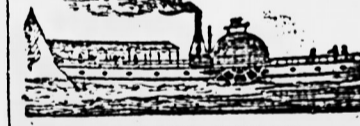

**THE STEAM-BOAT MARYLAND**

Commenced her regular route on Wednesday last the 2d March, at 7 o'clock, from the lower end of Buchanan's wharf, (immediately adjoining Major Isaac M-Kim's steam mill on Smith's wharf) for Annapolis and Easton, by way of Castle Haven; And on Thursday 3d day of March, will leave Easton by way of Castle-Haven, the same hour for Annapolis and Baltimore, leaving Annapolis at 2 o'clock and continuing to leave the above places as follows: Buchanan's wharf, Baltimore, on Wednesdays and Saturdays, and Easton on Sundays and Thursdays, at 7 o'clock during the season.
