### THE STEAM-BOAT MARYLAND

Commenced her regular route on Wednesday last the 2d March, at 7 o'clock, from the lower end of Buchanan's wharf, (immediately adjoining Major Isaac McKim's steam mill on Smith's wharf.) for Annapolis and Easton, by way of Castle-Haven: And on Thursday 3d day of March, will leave Easton by way of Castle-Haven, the same hour for Annapolis and Baltimore, leaving Annapolis at 2 o'clock and continuing to leave the above places as follows: Buchanan's wharf, Baltimore, on Wednesdays and Saturdays, and Easton on Sundays and Thursdays, at 7 o'clock during the season.

Passengers wishing to proceed to Philadelphia, will be put on board the Union Line of Steam-boats, in the Patuxent river, and arrive there by 9 o'clock next morning. 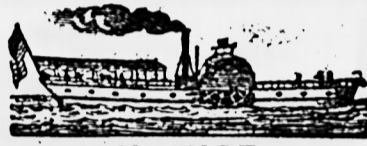

### EXTRACT FROM AN ESSAY ON FEMALE EDUCATION.

"What then seems to be the true destination of woman? For what purpose was she created? What particular province was assigned her? And what relation was she formed to sustain to her associate man? When we are able, correctly, to answer these enquiries, we shall have learned the first and most important lesson on the subject of female education. From the comparative feebleness of body and delicacy of constitution, which distinguishes woman, we may fairly infer that she was never designed for the labours of the field or the fatigues of the case. Savage cruelty has, indeed, sometimes imposed upon females the drudgery of sheaving, wooding and drawing water, reserving for the ruler sex the less ignominious toils of war and hunting; but this fact only evinces the helplessness of woman and her utter inability to resist this brutal encroachment upon her natural rights. The chase has been occasionally resorted to by some fair Diana as a mean of pastime and recreation; and patriotism has sometimes nerve the female arm with unwearied energy, and sent forth its band of Amazons to meet their country's invaders;—but these are rare examples—we regard them as something out of the ordinary course of nature. The custom of most countries has assigned to the fair sex lighter and more delicate employments, and the wisdom and the feelings of the enlightened part of mankind sanction the arrangement. A corresponding distinction has always existed in the intellectual labours of the sexes. From the hour of her creation, down to this very day, woman, though always lovely, has ever been prone to err in thought and deed. The violation of the forbidden tree was only the driving of the staple, to which has been attached that lengthening chain of female errors & imprudencies, to which our modern fair ones are adding new links from day to day. Whether the story of man's first disobedience in Paradise be an idle fiction (as some have imagined it) or not, it conveys at least the opinion of its author, whoever he was, on the comparative excellence of the female mind. Milton, a sagacious observer of human nature, very strongly intimates his ideas on this subject when he represents Eve, on a certain occasion, as retiring in disgust from the sedate and rational conversation of her spouse;—

"So spake our sire, and from his countenance, seemed Entering on studious thought abstract, which Eve Perceiving what she had retired in sight With lowliness majestic, from her seat, And grace that won who saw to wish her stay, Rose and went forth amidst her fruits and flowers, To visit how they prospered."

The Rose and the Lilly were to her congenial graces. She preferred to wander over the flowery fields and to hear the melody of other own woodland choristers; leaving it to the more vigorous faculties of the man to explore the fields of mental research, and to listen to the harmony of the spheres. In another passage the same writer speaks more unequivocally on this subject. These lines cannot be misapprehended:

"For well I understand in the prime and Of nature—her inferior in the mind. And inward faculties, which most excel."

Nor is this the language of envy and detraction. However arrogant man may be, his exalted rank in creation, and however jealous of any participation in his high destinies, on the part of inferior animals, surely this ungenerous feeling does not extend itself in any portion of
