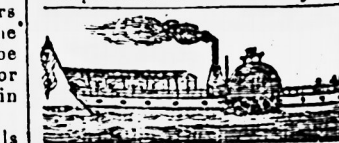

THE STEAM BOAT MARYLAND

Commenced her regular route on Wednesday last the 2d March, at 7 o'clock, from the lower end of Buchanan's wharf, (immediately adjoining Major Isaac McKim's steam mill on Smith's wharf), for Annapolis and Easton, by way of Castle-Haven; and on Thursday 3d day of March, will leave Easton by way of Castle-Haven, the same hour for Annapolis and Baltimore, leaving Annapolis at 2 o'clock and continuing to leave the above places as follows: Buchanan's wharf, Baltimore, on Wednesdays and Saturdays, and Easton on Sundays and Thursdays, at 7 o'clock during the season.

Passengers wishing to proceed to Philadelphia, will be put on board the Philadelphia, will be put on board the Union Line of Steam-boats, in the Patapsco river, and arrive there by 9 o'clock next morning. The Maryland will commence her route from Baltimore to Queen's-Town and Chester-Town, on Monday 7th March, leaving Buchanan's wharf at 9 o'clock every Monday, and Chester-Town every Tuesday, at the same hour. In Queen's-Town and Baltimore, during the season 'Horses and carriages will be taken on board from either of the above places, except Queen's-Town. All baggage at the risk of the owners. All persons expecting small packages, or other freight, will send for them when the boat arrives, pay freight and take them away.

Captain Levin Jones, at Castle-Haven, will keep horses and carriages for the conveyance of passengers to and from Cambridge. Passengers will pay their own stage fare.
