**BY HIS EXCELLENCY SAMUEL STEVENS, GOVERNOR OF MARYLAND, A Proclamation.**  
 WHEREAS, authentic information has been lodged in the Executive department of this State, that a most atrocious burglary and robbery was committed on the night of the 13th day of September last, by two men, breaking into the house of Adam Swigart, of Frederick county, an infirm old man with only his wife and a small grand child, and robbing him of one hundred and fifty dollars in specie, and sundry articles of clothing, after tying the said Swigart and his wife together. And whereas a certain Henry Schnebly lately discharged from the Penitentiary, being strongly suspected of being one of said robbers, was arrested at this residence in Washington county, on the 21st September last, by Jacob Glazier a constable, by virtue of a state warrant for that purpose. After a severe and dangerous struggle between the said constable and the said Henry Schnebly, his wife, and two daughters and a son-in-law; the said Schnebly's clothes being torn to rags in the scuffle he begged permission to change them; that whilst in the chamber for that purpose with the said constable, and after the prisoner had put on a shirt and pair of shoes, a double barrel gun was thrust through a small glass window, by some one of the family, and was seized by the prisoner, cocked and presented at the said constable, so suddenly that he had not the power to prevent it; at which crisis the whole family rallied, and with the advantages thus obtained effected his rescue, and forced the said constable and his assistant to retire; that the character of the said Schnebly is so desperate, no assistance of any kind to retake him could be procured in the immediate neighbourhood, on account of fear of the said Schnebly and his family. And whereas, it is of the first importance to the peace and well being of society, that such offenders should be brought to justice.
