Mr. Teackle reports a bill, entitled, An act for the relief of certain literary institutions.

Thursday, January 5, 1826.

The bill incorporating the Maryland Institute for the promotion of the mechanic arts, was sent to the senate.

Mr. Hall obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act extending the time of taking the bond of Henry H. Johns, sheriff of Harford county. Ordered, That Messrs. Hall, Williams and Montgomery, report the same.

Mr. Hall reports said bill; which was twice read, and sent to the senate.

The message from the senate, with the resolution incorporated therein, relative to absconding slaves, was read the second time, as also the message in reply proposed by Mr. Lee, and severally assented to; the blank being first filled up with Messrs. Lee and Goldsborough on the part of this house. The message and resolution were sent to the senate.

Mr. Kennedy obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act granting to the commonwealth of Pennsylvania, the right to cut a canal from the Maryland like to the Potomac river. Ordered, That Messrs. Kennedy, Merrick and Kershner, report the same.

Mr. Williams obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to repeal all such parts of the law as authorise attorneys, practising in the courts of this state, to charge and collect legal fees. Ordered, That Messrs. Williams, Gilpin, McCulloch, Howard and Hall, report the same.

The speaker laid before the house a communication from the honourable Samuel Smith, esq. a senator in the senate of the United States, relative to the interest on money borrowed by this state during the war, as being a claim against the United States.

On motion by Mr. Ridout, Ordered, That the committee appointed on the subject of appeal bonds, be instructed to incorporate in the bill to be reported by them, a provision which shall render more effectual the security given in injunction bonds.

The resolution relative to the payment of members and officers of the legislature, was read the second time, assented to, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Shower presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Baltimore county, praying the levy courts may be elected immediately by the people; referred to Messrs. Shower, Merrick, Thomas, Barnes and Tyson.

Mr. Turner obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, A supplement to the act, entitled, An act to extend the jurisdiction of justices of the peace in this state. Ordered, That Messrs. Turner, Ennalls, Montgomery, Tyson and Parker, report the same.

Mr. Garner obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to change the name of John A. Johnson, Hezekiah Johnson, Zackia Johnson, Uriah Johnson and Catharine Johnson, to Bowie. Ordered, That Messrs. Garner, Rogerson and Chapman, report the same.

Mr. Douglas obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to alter and amend so much of the constitution and form of government as relates to clerks of the county courts, and registers of wills. Ordered, That Messrs. Douglas, Ennalls, Saulsbury, Merrick and Garner, report the same.

Mr. Sappington presents a petition from James Crawford, of Frederick county, praying for a pension; referred to the committee on pensions and revolutionary claims.

Mr. Chapman presents a memorial from the justices of the orphans court of Charles county, upon the subject of unrecorded papers in the office of register of wills; referred to Messrs. Chapman, Edelen and Garner.

The house, according to the order of the day, proceeded to the second reading of the bill to confirm an act passed at December session 1824, entitled, An act for the relief of the Jews in Maryland.

On motion by Mr. Kennedy, it was indefinitely postponed.

On motion by Mr. Kennedy, the house proceeded to the second reading of the bill from the senate on the same subject. And the question was put, Shall the said bill pass?

The speaker laid before the house a letter from the hon'ble John C. Herbert, esq. with a memorial on behalf of the convention for the promotion of internal improvement, accompanied by the preamble and resolutions of the convention on that subject; referred to the committee on internal improvement.

On motion by Mr. Kennedy, Ordered, That John C. Herbert, Daniel Murray and Robert T. Spence, Esquires, who have presented a memorial from the convention lately held in Baltimore on the subject of internal improvement, be invited by the speaker to seats within the bar of this house.

The clerk of the senate returns the resolution relative to the payment of the members and officers, endorsed "assented to."

On motion by Mr. Maxcy, the following resolution was read and assented to:

By the House of Delegates, Jan. 5, 1826. Resolved by the general assembly of Maryland, That a commission, signed by the president of the senate and speaker of the house of delegates, and certified by his excellency the governor, with the great seal of the state annexed, shall issue to the deputation from this general assembly, to the legislatures of the states of Pennsylvania, Delaware and New-Jersey, certifying to each of those legislatures the authority with which that deputation is clothed, in the form following:

To the honourable the Legislature of _____ These are to certify, that Ezekiel F. Chambers, a member of the senate, and Archibald Lee and Robert H. Goldsborough, members of the house of delegates, have been appointed by the general assembly of the state of Maryland, as deputies to the legislature of the state of _____, with authority to negotiate with said legislature, for the purpose of procuring such aid by legislative provisions, or otherwise, as may be most effectual for the recovery of persons bound to, or owing service or labour, to citizens of Maryland, who have heretofore absconded, or who shall hereafter abscond, or flee from Maryland into the state of _____.

Witness our hands, with the great seal of the state hereunto annexed, this _____ day of _____, in the year of our Lord eighteen hundred and twenty-six.

By order, John Brewer, Clk. Mr. Duval presents a petition from Mountjoy Bayley, praying compensation for revolutionary services; referred to Messrs. Duval, Howard and Beall.

Mr. Barnes presents a petition from Richard Potts and Wm. Bradley Tyler, of Frederick county, executors, in Maryland, of Wm. Mardock of London, deceased, praying to be authorised to invest the amount of certain legacies as therein mentioned; referred to Messrs. Barnes, Farquhar and Cockey.

The house adjourns until to-morrow morning 10 o'clock.

The order requiring information from the commissioners of the school fund, for Queen-Anne's county, was read the second time and assented to.

On motion by Mr. Banning, the following resolution was read, assented to, and sent to the senate:

Resolved, That William K. Landen esq. appointed treasurer for the eastern shore of Maryland, be, and he is hereby required, before he proceeds to execute the duties of his said office, to give bond to the state of Maryland, in the penalty of twenty thousand dollars, with at least two securities to be approved of by the governor and council, for the due and faithful performance and discharge of all the duties of him required as treasurer aforesaid.

Resolved, That John K. B. Emory, esq. late treasurer of the eastern shore of Maryland, be, and he is hereby required forthwith to deliver unto William K. Landen, esq. of Talbot county, the present treasurer for the eastern shore of Maryland, all monies in the treasury, books of accounts, and other papers appertaining to said treasury.

Mr. Hughlett reports a bill, entitled, An act for the benefit of Richard Mason, of Caroline county; which was twice read by special order, passed, and sent to the senate.

Mr. Cockey presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Frederick county, praying for a lottery to raise a sum of money to complete the Deep Run Woolen Manufactory; referred to Messrs. Cockey, Farquhar and Sappington.

Mr. Barnes reports a bill for the relief of the executors, in Maryland, of William Murdoch of London, deceased.

And Mr. Tyson reports a bill, entitled, An act to incorporate the Lafayette Beneficial Society of Baltimore.

Mr. Thomas presents a petition from sundry inhabitants of Cecil county, residing in Port Deposit, and its vicinity, praying that the levy court of Cecil county may be required to alter and improve a road leading from said village to "Chesapeake;" referred to Messrs. Thomas, Grubb and Harlan.

Mr. Garner presents a petition from Mary Ann Clements, of Charles county, for support; referred to the standing committee on similar petitions.

Mr. Tyson presents a petition from Horace Morris, praying an act of insolvency; referred to the standing committee on similar subjects.

Mr. Douglas obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to repeal an act to increase the pay of the judges of the orphan's court in the counties of Baltimore, Dorchester and Washington, passed December session 1818, chapter 45, so far as relate to Dorchester county. Ordered, That Messrs. Douglas, Eccleston and Brohawn, report the same.

The clerk of the senate returns the resolution relative to licences to keepers of billiard tables, endorsed, "assented to with the proposed amendment;" which amendment was assented to.

Also the resolution relative to the bond of the treasurer of the eastern shore, endorsed, "assented to with the proposed amendments;" which amendments were read and assented to.

And the resolution relative to the form of commission to the members of the deputation to sister states, endorsed, "assented to."

Mr. Goldsborough delivers the following report:

The committee appointed in pursuance of an order of the house upon the executive message of the 31st December last, "To examine and take an inventory of the furniture, &c. now belonging to the government house, and also to examine the governor's accounts of expenditures of the money appropriated and placed at his disposal by resolution of the general assembly, December session 1822," beg leave to report—

That they have examined the several apartments in the government-house, and taken an inventory of the state's property; they have also examined the governor's accounts and expenditures of the money appropriated for that house, and found the house and apartments, together with all the furniture, in the neatest and best order, every thing was marked by a well regulated attention and taste. The committee think the appropriations have been most prudently and judiciously applied. They saw nothing to criticise, but every thing commanded their approbation.

In examining the accounts, they found vouchers carefully preserved for every thing, except a few bills of very inconsiderable amount, and as it was scarcely possible, in procuring the necessary furniture for such an establishment, to make the expenditures and appropriation to agree exactly, yet this has been done as nearly, it appears to your committee, as could have been expected.

Your committee further report, that the appropriation of 1822, was one thousand dollars, and the amount of bills rendered for purchases by the governor, is eleven hundred and seventy-eight dollars and sixty-seven and a half cents—exceeding the appropriation by one hundred and seventy-eight dollars and sixty-seven and a half cents.

This money, appearing to your committee to have been most judiciously applied, they conclude their report by recommending to the house the following resolution:

Resolved, That the treasurer of the western shore be and he is hereby authorised and directed, to pay to Samuel Stevens, esq. late governor of Maryland, the sum of one hundred and seventy-eight dollars and sixty-seven and a half cents, out of any unappropriated money now in the treasury.

By the House of Delegates, Jan. 9, 1826. Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Congress of the United States does possess the power, under the constitution, to adopt a general system of internal improvement, as a national measure.

On motion by Mr. Merrick,

Ordered, That so much of said memorial relates to the election of senators, be referred to the committee appointed to bring in a bill to alter and change all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the election of the senate.

That so much as relates to the offices of clerk and register, be referred to the committee heretofore appointed to bring in a bill to alter and change all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the clerks of county courts and registers of wills.

And that all such parts of said memorial as relate to the levy court be referred to the committee appointed to bring in a bill to provide for the election of the levy court by the people.

Mr. Potter obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to repeal so much of the act of assembly passed at December session 1824, requiring the judges of the county courts in the 4th judicial district in Maryland to set apart certain days for the transaction of chancery business so far as the same respects Caroline county. Ordered, That Messrs. Potter, Hughlett and Keen, report the same.

On motion by Mr. Teackle,

Ordered, That the treasurer of the western shore be required to report to this house the amount of stocks sold, the time or times when, and of the means raised by loan or loans, and the time of each, to defray the expenditures of the late war; also the amounts refunded or repaid to the state by the United States, and the times at which they were respectively received at the treasury, and also the amount heretofore claimed by the state of Maryland, the payment of which has been suspended.

Mr. Williams reports a bill, entitled, An act to limit the operation and effect of mortgages.

Tuesday, Jan. 10.

Mr. McCulloch presents a petition from Daniel Swartzentroyer, and others, praying they may be authorised to hold real property; referred.

The speaker laid before the house a communication from the mayor of Baltimore, in compliance with an order of this house; referred.

Mr. McCulloch presents petitions from Daniel Day and William Ballison; severally referred.

Mr. Parker presents a petition from John Blake.

Mr. McCulloch presents a petition from Susanna G. Edmondson, for a divorce; referred.

The bill to encourage the destruction of crows in the several counties therein mentioned, was passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Williams reports a bill, entitled, An act to repeal all such parts of the law as authorise attorneys practising in the courts of this state, to charge and collect legal fees.

Mr. Tyson presents a petition from John B. Davidge, and others, praying legislative aid for the medical society of Baltimore; referred.

The leave asked by Mr. Williams to bring in a bill to reduce the per diem of the members, was read the second time, and the question put, That the house grant the same? Determined in the negative—yeas 24, nays 43.

Mr. Spencer obtained leave to bring in a bill to provide for a valuation of real and personal property in Talbot county.

Mr. Thomas reports a bill to withdraw the donations from the West Nottingham and Elkton Academies, in Cecil county, and for other purposes.

The clerk of the senate returns the resolution in favour of the literary institution, endorsed "assented to." The bill for the relief of the executors in Maryland, of Wm. Murdoch, of London, deceased, endorsed "will pass." Ordered to be engrossed.

And a bill authorising the Mayor and City Council of Baltimore, to appoint wood-corders for said city, endorsed "will pass."

Mr. Grubb reports a bill for the benefit of the stockholders of the Susquehanna bridge.

Wednesday, Jan. 11.

The bill to authorise aliens to purchase and hold real property within this state, was sent to the senate.

Mr. Speed presents petitions from Joseph Simmons and William J. Pearce, praying for support; referred.

Mr. A. E. Jones obtained leave to bring in a bill for the permanent location of the treasury office for the eastern shore.

Mr. Spencer obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to amend and reduce into one system the several acts of assembly respecting officers fees, for the better regulation of said fees; to establish a new, equitable, equal and uniform mode of charging them in the several and respective public offices throughout this state, and for other purposes.

Mr. Speed presents a petition from George Jordan, praying allowance for services rendered the state; referred to the committee of claims.

The clerk of the senate delivers a bill to compensate the trustees of the poor of Caroline county for services, endorsed "will pass," which was read.

The supplement to the act, entitled, An act to amend and reduce into one system the several acts of assembly respecting officers fees, was passed and sent to the senate.

Mr. Barnes reports a bill, entitled, An act to repeal an act to compensate the adjutant general of this state.

Mr. Howard presents the report of the trustees of Garrison Forest Academy; referred.

Mr. Worthington reports a bill, to confirm and make valid the acts and proceedings of justices of the peace in this state.

Mr. Ennalls obtained leave to bring in a bill to regulate the meetings of the trustees of the poor of Dorchester county.

Army and Navy pension lists.

The recent discussion in Congress, it was stated by Mr. Cambreleng, that while the pension list amounts to a million and a half dollars, the navy pension list is only about ten thousand; and that the latter is all out of a fund created by the seamen themselves; they having at different periods while in the service of the U. S. made appropriation of part of their prize money for the purpose. The former is charged upon the public treasury, and it appears, amounts annually to nearly one half the sum, which the navy commissioners, in their reports, are declared requisite for the support of the whole navy during the present year. It is probable, there is no naval establishment in the world, of the same extent, which costs less for its maintenance than the navy of the United States.
