On motion by Mr. Kennedy, the following resolution was read:

Resolved by the General Assembly of Maryland, That the Congress of the United States do possess the power, under the constitution, to adopt a general system of internal improvement, as a national measure.

On motion by Mr. Merrick:

Ordered, That so much of said memorial as relates to the election of senators, be referred to the committee appointed to bring in a bill to alter and change all such parts of the constitution and form of government as relate to the election of senators.

And that all such parts of said memorial as relate to the levy court be referred to the committee appointed to bring in a bill to provide for the election of the levy court by the people.

Mr. Potter obtained leave to bring in a bill, entitled, An act to repeal so much of the act of assembly passed at December session, 1824, requiring the judges of the county courts in the 4th judicial district in Maryland to set apart certain days for the transaction of chancery business so far as the same respects Caroline county.

Ordered, That Messrs. Potter, Hughtlett and Keen, report the same.

On motion by Mr. Teackle:

Ordered, That the treasurer of the western shore be required to report to this house the amount of stocks sold, the time or times when, and of the means raised by loan or loans, and the time of each, to defray the expenditures of the late war, also the amounts refunded or repaid to the state by the United States, and the times at which they were respectively received at the treasury, and also the amount heretofore claimed by the state of Maryland, the payment of which has been suspended.

If such should be found the happy result of the ensuing election, it will add twofold to the honour and gratification I shall feel, in entering upon duties that I shall not feel it to discharge in a manner to increase and secure your best and dearest interests, and I trust, in a manner that shall win over at last, even my enemies, for I cannot flatter myself so far as to believe I have none, although I am not myself an enemy, I trust, to a man of earth, whose name is that of a brother whom I should be glad to see in the arms of his God, whom he hath not seen.
