 DR. FRANKLIN'S
 Legacy to Mechanics.
 Among the charities of Philadelphia, may be enumerated the bequest of Dr. Franklin, to the corporation of the city, for the purpose of lending small sums to such young unmarried artificers, under the age of 25, as have served an apprenticeship in the city and faithfully fulfilled the duties required in the indentures; the legacy amounted to £1000. No loan to one person to exceed £60. The interest paid by the borrower is 5 per centum, and he is to give bond with two securities for the repayment of the money. The present amount of the sum, including interest due is \$17,596, being an increase of \$13,152. Dr. Franklin calculated that at the end of 100 years, it would amount to \$215,000, or 580, 60 dollars; of which he directed, that \$100,000 should be applied to public uses, and the balance of \$115,000 left to accumulate for another century, at the end of which period it will amount to 4 millions of pounds sterling—which sum is to be divided between the inhabitants of Philadelphia and the state of Pennsylvania.

 Dear Sir—An opportunity in the capture of the brig Sylph, which will sail from this port, for Baltimore, enables me to forward to you a few seeds, and of a kind which I have no doubt will take kindly in our soil. The wheat, you will perceive, is of a hard flinty kind, and I am informed is never subject to smut or to the visitation of the fly. The bean is in flavour prodigiously fine, and yields a most abundant crop to the portion placed in the ear; the seed of a highly flavoured pumpkin, which in flavour, is very little inferior to our yellow musk melon—all of which I send to you for such distribution as in your own judgment may seem fit, should they prove acceptable.
