Dorchester County.—This county,
was one amongst the few which at the
late election rejected the "Primary
School system." This decision it
seems, is not in accordance with the
wishes of many of her residents. A
petition, to be presented to the le-
gisature at its next session, is now
circulating among her citizens for sig-
natures, praying that a law may pass
to admit her to an equal participation
of the benefits of public instruction as
contemplated by that system.
We hope that the petition will bear
the names of a sufficient number of
her voters to warrant the legislature
in granting the prayer. The establish-
ment of the schools could not possibly
operate to the injury of the county,
but on the contrary would, in the
course of time, add to the number of
her intelligent inhabitants.

MEXICO.—Vera Cruz papers to the
16th ult. have been received at Phila-
delphia. The *Mercurio* of the 12th,
contains a letter addressed by Mr.
Poinsett to the citizens of the United
States residing in Mexico, inviting
them to join the legation in wearing
crapes on the left arm for thirty days,
in testimony of respect for the memo-
ries of Thomas Jefferson and John A-
dams.
The receipts of the custom house at
Vera Cruz, during the month of July,
amounted to \$515,772, one hundred
thousand of which were appropriated
towards paying the interest on the debt
due to England.
On the 20th August the election of
representatives for the National Con-
gress, took place in Mexico. The A-
ngela states that the liberal party tri-
umphed completely in the metropolis,
and was believed to have done so
throughout the Mexican Union. At an
early hour in the morning, says that
paper, the whole population of the cap-
ital was in motion, proceeding to the
polls. It does not appear that any
disorders occurred.
There is to be a general public re-
ciprocity on the day of the installation
of "the great American Diet" at Ta-
cuayana.

THE ELECTION.
The official returns of the election
held on Tuesday last, have not come in,
even for the county; but we have re-
ceived such information from all the
townships, as to render it certain that
Gen. JAMES FINDLAY's plurality in
Hamilton county, over David Morris is
about 950 votes. We have heard from
five townships in Clermont county, in-
cluding Batavia and Williamsburg, the
strong holds of David Morris, in which
Gen Findlay had 180 and D. Morris
421 votes. The townships heard from,
we are told, usually give about half
the votes of the county, and in the re-
maining townships Gen. Findlay will
receive a handsome support. We be-
lieve we may safely assure the friends
of General Jackson, that Gen. JAMES
FINDLAY is re-elected to Congress
from the first district in Ohio, not-
withstanding the friends of the admi-
nistration candidate put forth their
whole strength, and two Jacksonian
candidates were run in this district.

Capt. Bell, of the schooner Eclipse,
at Norfolk, from Havana, reports that
all the frigates, which sailed from Ha-
vana 28th August, bound for Mexico,
had returned, having encountered the
September gale, by which they sus-
