Fowler, by BENJAMIN BUCKMASTER, both of the said county, and that the said Buckmaster hath fled from justice. And whereas, it is of the first importance to society, that perpetrators of such heinous offences should be brought to condign punishment. Now, therefore, I have thought proper to issue this my proclamation, and do, by and with the advice and consent of the council, offer a reward of

200 Dollars,

To any person or persons, who shall apprehend the said Benjamin Buckmaster, and lodge him in any jail, so that he may be brought to justice.
