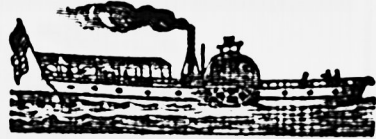


A bargain for Cash.

THE STEAM BOAT MARYLAND

Will commence her regular route on Wednesday the first of March, at seven o'clock, from the lower end of Buchanan's wharf (immediately adjoining Maj. McKim's steam mill on Smith's wharf,) for Annapolis and Easton, by way of Castle Haven; and on Thursday, 2d of March, will leave Easton by way of Castle Haven, at the same hour for Annapolis and Baltimore, leaving Annapolis at 2 o'clock, and continuing to leave the above places as follows: Buchanan's wharf, Baltimore, on Wednesdays and Saturdays and Easton on Sundays and Thursdays at 7 o'clock during the season.

Passengers wishing to proceed to Philadelphia will be put on board the Union Line of steam boats in the Patuxent river, and arrive there by 9 o'clock next morning.

The Maryland will commence her route from Baltimore to Queenstown and Chestertown on Monday, the 13th of March, leaving Buchanan's wharf at 9 o'clock every Monday, and Chestertown every Tuesday, at the same hour, for Queenstown and Baltimore during the season. Horses and Carriages will be taken on board from either of the above places except Queenstown.

All baggage at the risk of the owners. All persons expecting small packages or other freights, will send for them when the boat arrives, pay freight and take them away. Captain Levin Jones, at Castle Haven, will keep horses and carriages for the conveyance of passengers to and from Cambridge.

Passengers between Cambridge and Castle Haven, will settle the fare for their conveyance, with Captain Jones. From the commencement of the ensuing season the rates to be charged for passage money to be as follows: From Easton and Castle Haven to Baltimore—and from Baltimore to either of those places
