After the lapse of abou fifteen minutes, his master went to the chamber door a third time which he found fastened, and caled to the prisoner, who resused to open the door; the deteased force it open, and was struck with th treadle by the prisoner, with such force as to knock him down. The jury retired to their room, and soon after came into Court with a ver dict of Guilty, The prisoner we then asked by the Judge, if he had ought to say why the sentence of the law should not be pronounce upon him, in answer to which in quiry, he said that he had so intention of killing the deceased but as the witness had sworn him to the gallows, he wished the time for his execution to be put off as long a was possible, to give him an oppor-tunity for repentance. The judge then in an impressive and feeting manner, remarked to the prisoner, that he had been brought to his present situation from an indulgence of unbridled passion, which had been shown to have controuted him th oughout his apprenticeship; that an aber ation from virtuous feelings and disposition, had marked his character, and admonished ain to make his peace with a higher Terbunal, at whose bar he must shortly appear to answer for the deeds done in the body; at the same time intimating an opinion that there was no hope for mer y from pardoning power in this State, as the crime had been clearly proved and the malice abundantly shown. The sentence of the Court was then stated to be, that on Friday the 9th of February next between the hour of 10 o'clock A. M. and 2 P. M you, David Darby, jun. be taken from the prison to the place of excution, and there hung until you are dead. And may God have mercy on your soul. The deceased was 26 years of

age, of industrious habits, and sustained the character of an hones uporght citizen. The prisoner will be 20 years old in February, is of robust appearance and has a down cast look.—Throughout the trial he manifested an indifference to his late which was shocking to humanity.


