HOUSE OF DELEGATES, 1837.

WEDNESDAY, February 21, 1837.
The House met. The prayer was read by the Chaplain. The Journal of the previous day was read and approved. A message was received from the Senate, containing the following resolutions: Resolved, That the members of the legislature, in respect to the memory of Thomas F. Bennett, Esq. late a delegate from Talbot county, who departed this life while attending to the discharge of his official duties, wear the usual mourning, during the remainder of the session, and that the expense of conveying his body to the eastern shore, be placed on the journal of accounts.
