The Washington Monument at Bal-

timore.

Among the communications relative to this wars, made to the gislature which has just closed its session, we observe the following description of it, and the varied and beautiful prospect to be surveyed from its top: To those who have not seen the monament, which is constructed of white marble, this notice

monument, which is constructed of white marble, this notice of it may not be altogether destitute of interest.

The design of the monument bears the character of a Greek Doric column, of massive proportions; elevated on a grand base or zocle; the column is surmounted by a circular pedestal, on which

stands a colossal (colossean) statue of Washington; the whole

Constructed of white maible.

The grand base is 50 feet square, and 25 feet high; the column is 20 feet in diameter at the base, and, with its sub-base 150 feet high; the entire height of the monument is 175 feet above the povement of the street, and 185 above the foundations.

It stands on an elevated hill, (100 feet above the tide,) at the intersection of four principal screets, in a square of 200 feet.

The streets to the south and north are 110 feet wide, 30 feet of which are reserved for a promonade, enclosed and planted with

The monument is encircled with a massive iron railing, 350 feet in circumference, orened on the four fronts by iron gate-

ways, and ornamented with lamp stands.

On every front of the grand base, a flight of marble steps, (flanked by massy blocks surmounted with Tripods,) leads up to

door-ways, which open into vaulted galleries, surrounding the

A broad frieze runs round the exterior of the grand base,

(inmediately under the great cornice.) enriched with a series of civic wreaths, each encircling a star, designating the states constituting the union. In the centre of this frieze, (above the door

ways,) are large murble tablets, inscribed with the name of

Washington. Over the great cornice, a blocking course runs round the base, crowned at the four angles with military tro-

Bronze inscriptions, commemorative of the events of the revo-bution connected with the life of Washington, are to be inscrib-ed in Lixin and English, on every front of the base. The fol-lowing is one that has been proposed by the architect, Mr. Mills:

On entering the gallery of the grand base, from the north, an archway presents itself on the opposite side, which leads into the state way, where on the right is discovered a flight of granite

steps, descending to the subterranean vaults, and on the left a

In the base of the column above the great platform, is proposed to be encircled with 15 colossal bronze shields, emblematical of the
