A Democratic Republican Convention of the members of the Pennsylvania Legislature, was held in the State Capitol on the evening of the 2d inst. when resolutions were passed friendly to the election of General Jackson, and appointing the 8th of January next for the assembling of a convention at Harrisburgh, to nominate an electoral ticket.

The Harrisburgh Chronicle says that 85 members were present and voted unanimously for the resolutions, and that other members, to the number of about fifteen, were on their way to the committee room of the capital in which the convention sat, but the convention adjourned before their arrival.
