Those, therefore, who are bona fide such, may be allowed to land with their baggage, care being taken that this construction of the act be not a violation of any of its provisions.

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mind could devise or savage barbarity execute. At one time Gregory became so exasperated with pain, that in a state of wildness approaching insanity, he rose upon his tormentors and actually succeeded in bringing several of them to the ground. Upon this, some of the Indians in their language exclaimed, "he is a good soldier;" but for his reward, his right arm, which had done the deed, was stripped, and on the inside a gash cut from the wrist to the shoulder, into which was introduced a hot walnut rod, and the flesh again closed. As if this was not sufficient entirely to disable this member, they immediately shot several bullets through his arm in different places, and then left him to groan and sigh that his hours of existence might be few and his lingering torments soon overpower the pulsation of life.

At another time his tongues were cut out; Gregory about one third, and the others entirely to the roots. Consequently, Gregory is the only one who can utter a word, and he indistinctly, and from him the principal information is derived. They finally succeeded in effecting their escape by the assistance of a squaw who in kindness accompanied them through the forest, a distance of 45 miles, and placed them on a tract by which they succeeded in reaching the white settlements. At the time they made the last attempt to free themselves, they were 800 miles from any white habitations. Many more of their sufferings and hardships could be told, but what we have already related is sufficient to shock the feelings of humanity, and to excite the warmest sympathy for these miserable fellow beings; who, at this late day, so long after the execution of the heartless deeds, bear about them but the too visible proofs of the truth of their story. Nichols and the third we understand left wives and families in this city, and Gregory a mother, who had long since numbered them with the dead.

Norfolk, May 2.

INTERESTING ARRIVAL.
Three men, Gregory, Nichols, and another whose name we have not learned, former residents of this city, arrived in town last week, after a fifteen years' captivity among the Indians. Early in the late war, William Gregory, then at the age of only eleven years, enlisted in the United States service, under Capt. Watson of this city; & the others entering the army about the same time, they were all ordered to the western or Canada lines together. They had not remained long on that station before they were compelled to engage in several skirmishes with the Indians, in one of which, these three, with sixty-one others were captured. After changing masters, several times, they at last found themselves in the power of the tribe called Flat Heads, by whom they were taken to the Rocky Mountains, and taught the red man's art of hunting and fishing.
During the long lingering years of their servitude, Gregory, with the other two, made four several attempts to escape, but were as many times re-taken; and as a punishment for their bold endeavour, they were subjected to the most cruel and excruciating tortures which the untutored

POSTSCRIPT

LABORDE'S SQUADRON.
The sch. Red Fox, Capt. Young, arrived at Norfolk on the 4th inst. reports, that on Sunday, 22d ult. she passed within musket shot of Com. Laborde's squadron, consisting of the frigates Lealard and Pearl, then abreast of Key Cadas, on the Florida Coast.
Com. Porter's squadron was at Key West on the 31st of April.

OHIO CANAL.
The water has been let into the Miami Canal at Middletown, and permitted to flow to the first lock. The whole work is in such advancement, that no doubt is entertained that the water will pass from Middletown to Cincinnati in the course of the present season.

Alexandria, (D. C.) May 8.
On Saturday last the awful sentence of death was pronounced by Chief Justice Cranch, upon Jonathan Devaughn, the murderer of Tobias Martin. The execution is ordered to take place in the county of Alexandria on Wednesday the 27th day of next month.

VERY LATE FROM EUROPE.
Of the numerous valuable arrivals yesterday, the Henri IV. Capt. Skiddon, from Havre, and Josephine, Coles, from Belfast, made their passages in 20 days, both having sailed on the 16th ult. The former has furnished Paris and Havre papers to the 15th, and the latter a Liverpool paper to the 12th, and London dates to the 10th of last month inclusive.
The official accounts from Portugal dated March 23d, state that the British troops remain stationary.
The Apostolic faction, whose head quarters are at Madrid, are greatly incensed at the intervention of England, and of the troops who have opposed the rebels. The province of Catalonia, it is said, is almost desolated by bands of royalists, who care for nothing but plunder. The Indicateur of Bordeaux, says that the British troops will be reinforced considerably, and adds that appearances are more than ever for war—Spain, and the Portuguese revolutionists are on the best terms, and France no doubt urges them on.

The Quotidienne contains the following extract of a private letter of the 31st March from Madrid. The most complete harmony prevails between the Portuguese royalists, and the Spanish authorities who have received them. The Marquis de Chaves has had horses bought at Toro, Medina, and Puenete, and a singular circumstance is, that the Portuguese royalists have a great number of arms of English manufacture. We are assured that an in-urrectional movement had taken place in Portugal, at Moro Novo, fifteen leagues from Lisbon, which excited the alarm of the Portuguese authorities. It is certain, that the greatest harmony prevails in that country from Trax to Montes in the Algarves. The Echo du Midi mentions the discovery of a conspiracy that had been formed at the very gates of Madrid. The conspirators are said to have been 800 in number, and 27 of them have been shot.

The ambassadors of England, France, and Russia, having received verbal refusals from the R. S. Effendi relative to the pacification of Greece, are only waiting, it is said, for written refusals, to express themselves in a more energetic manner. The Porte seems to think, says the Augsburg Gazette, that their excellencies will confine themselves to threats.
Orders have been received by the commandant at Gibraltar to have every thing strengthened, and in readiness. The revolutionary movements in Spain and Portugal indicate speedy trouble.
The report was current on the 9th ult. in London, that Mr. Canning had resigned. This story, however, appears to have too vague an authority to be entitled to much credit. It is not at all probable that at this time, with such troubled prospects in Portugal and Spain, he would withdraw from his controlling station, rendered more responsible by the part which he has lately acted.

The revenue of Great Britain for the last quarter, has fallen short about \$2,000,000.
Paris, April 12.
It was rumoured that the House of Commons is strongly in favour of Mr. Canning's being elevated to the dignity of Prime Minister, but that the House of Lords is decidedly opposed to it, and that His Britannic Majesty has postponed the nomination till after the Easter holidays.
Serious disturbances are said to have taken place in Catalonia.
